



College Credit Plus (CCP)

What is College Credit Plus?

- College Credit Plus is Ohio's dual credit program
 - Students earn high school and college credit at the same time
 - Students enroll in college courses and adhere to the requirements of the college

What is College Credit Plus?

- Students in Grades 7 through 12:
 - Must complete an assessment exam and be determined “eligible” for College Credit Plus
 - May apply to any public college or participating private college
 - May apply to multiple institutions

College Credit Plus Participation

- Required test scores:
- ACCUPLACER: Administered through the IHE
 - Reading: 80 Math: 55
- ACT-see slide for next available dates
 - Reading: 22 Math: 22 English: 18
- SAT –Evidence-based reading and writing: 480; Math 530



To-Do: College Credit Plus

- Students must be enrolled in grades 7-12
- Sign and return the “Intent to Participate Form” by April 1st
- File a CCP application with interested IHE
- Submit transcript to IHE (request from Mrs. Becker)
- Register and successfully complete ACT, SAT, or Accuplacer
- Attend a CCP registration session at the IHE.



What courses can a student take?

- Students must complete their First 15 credits in Level I courses, which include:
 - Transferable courses.
 - Courses in IT, Computer Science, Anatomy & Physiology, foreign language.
 - Courses that are part of a technical certificate.
 - Courses that are part of a 15- or 30-credit pathway.
 - Courses in study skills, academic or career success.

What courses can a student take?

- Colleges must post their Level I courses – see website for details
- Once a student completes the First 15 credit hours in Level I, he or she can move to Level II courses, which are any other allowable college courses for which a student meets the prerequisites.



What about Grades?

- *College Credit Plus grades earned in the college course is the same grade that will be on the high school transcript*
- *Grades will be factored into the high school and college GPA*



College Credits and Carnegie Units (HS)



Conversion

College:	High School
1 semester credit	.33 credit
2 semester credit	.66 credit
3 or more credits	1 credit

- Total college semester credits cannot exceed 30 per academic year
- High school credits are multiplied by 3, then subtracted from 30 to determine available college hours



Conversion Example



Student A: Takes 5 credits at McComb

$$5 \times 3 = 15$$

$$30 - 15 = 15$$

This student could take 15 semester hrs at IHE

Student B: Takes 7 credits at McComb

$$7 \times 3 = 21$$

$$30 - 21 = 9$$

This student could take 9 semester hrs at IHE

Student C: Takes 6 credits at McComb and 2 x 3 credit College Courses

$$6 \times 3 = 18$$

$$2 \times 3 = 6$$

$$30 - 24 = 6$$

This student could take 6 additional semester hrs at IHE



Important Reminders

- Students are eligible to take college courses during the summer. Any courses taken in summer of 2019 will calculate into the total allowable for the 2019-2020 school year
- If a student exceeds the 30 credit limit, the student is financially responsible for that entire course
- If a student fails to return books for the course, he/she will be charged for the books
- If a student wishes to participate, he/she needs to reflect intent on their schedule and work with Mrs. Becker to add this into their schedule for the 2019-2020 school year.

Transportation

- Transportation will need to be provided by the student
- Please consider the weather when determining if this is a right fit for your child
- Students are expected to attend college classes when the college is open

Deciding to Participate

- What are your future plans? Does this fit?
- You still have to meet high school graduation requirements
- GPA-a college course does affect high school GPA
- Scheduling: different start/end times, breaks, etc
- Athletics- must have 5 Carnegie units for HS sports
- Time- can you fit it all in?

Advantages of CCP

- Opportunity to take courses not offered at the high school
- Chance to experience college-level work prior to graduation
- Take challenging courses in the area of interest
- Receive both high school and college credits at no cost to you.


What are differences between high school and college?





Study Time:


- High School: Required homework ranges between 1 to 3 hours per day
- College: Standard rule of 2 to 3 hours of homework for every hour spent in class
- (Ex. Eng 111= 2.5 hrs/week, HW may be up to 7.5 hrs/week)







What are the consequences of underperforming?

- If students fail or withdraw too late from a college course, the district may seek reimbursement for the tuition costs from the student/family
 - The grades that students earn are on the students' college transcripts permanently
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What are the consequences of underperforming?

- If students perform poorly, they may be placed CCP probation, CCP dismissal or on academic probation or dismissal by the college
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What are the consequences of underperforming?



- **College Credit Plus Probation:**
 - A student will be placed on CCP probation if he or she earns less than a cumulative 2.0 GPA in CCP courses *or* withdraws from 2 or more courses in an academic term.



Potential Disadvantages of CCP

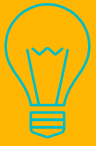
- Increased responsibility for learning
- Financial obligation if you fail, withdrawal untimely, go over 30 hours, or fail to return books
- Possible reduced time for job or extracurricular
- CCP classes factored into GPA effect HS GPA
- Travel time and increased study time
- Transportation responsibility

Potential Disadvantages of CCP

- Calendar differences; attendance is the students responsibility
- Socially students may face new challenges
- Failure to successfully complete a CCP course may result in a delay of graduation
- Parent access and FERPA-CCP
 - Students are treated as adults and they own their educational records on a college campus

Dual Enrollment

- We also offer dual enrollment courses here at McComb and Millstream
- Taught by McComb H.S. staff during the school day
- Students enrolling in dual enrollment abide by the same rules as CCP students

Bowling Green State University

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- CCP application online @ bgsu.edu/applyccp
- Deadline: April 15, 2019
- 3.0 overall GPA.
- High School students must attend CCP orientation at BGSU. After orientation, students may schedule, this is before BGSU students





University of Findlay®

- CCP application online - Deadline: June 1st, 2019
- 2.5 overall GPA and 20 ACT or 250 Reading Next-Gen Accuplacer
- Test scores: Due to UF by June 1st, 2019
- High School students schedule after UF students
- Representative: Shawn Jordan



- CCP application online - Deadline: August 23rd, 2019
- Books: Must check with McComb prior to getting from the bookstore. Must be returned to McComb at end of course.
- Schedule classes same as all Owens' students
- Students need to participate in an Owens orientation yearly.
- Representative: Ashley Miklovic



- CCP application online - Deadline: April 1st, 2019
- Books: Must check with McComb prior to getting from the bookstore. Must be returned to McComb at end of course.
- High School students schedule with their CCP advisor one week before Rhodes State students.
- Students need to participate in Rhodes State CCP first year orientation.
- Representative: Chad Teman

Transferability: If you earn a C or higher on a college course, it will transfer to another college.

Applicability: The course is equivalent to the course needed in the program of study at the college of your choice.
