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March 20th Will Bring Something Different for Everyone

On the day when all Juniors will take the ACT, making much of the school building unusable for normal class activities, we will take advantage of the free time for our other three classes. Each class will engage in the activity you see described below. All of these activities will take place in the first half of the day, with an early release scheduled for 12:25. Students will be provided transportation home at that time.

• Freshmen: College Visit to the University of Toledo

- We will meet with the freshmen at 7:35 in the Performing Arts Center to educate them on what to look for when they visit college campuses in the coming years. We will then bus the students to the University of Toledo for a tour and informational program. Students will need to bring their Chromebooks or a smartphone with the Google Sheets app downloaded. Students will be researching twenty-five aspects that can be used to compare one university to another. We will encourage students to share their findings with their counselors and parents. Students will be given a permission slip for the field trip on March 1st. We ask that it be returned the next day.

• Sophomores: Practice ACT

- The NVPO and Northview Faculty will host the sophomores in the Main Gym and Auxiliary Gymnasium for a practice ACT. Students will complete a timed, full practice ACT. We will score them and return the results to students within days. We will take this opportunity to educate students on what resources they can use to prepare to take the real ACT next spring.

• Juniors: ACT

- We will administer the ACT to all juniors on March 20. Please make sure your son or daughter reports on time. Students who are tardy will be required to retest on the make-up date in May.

• Seniors: Choose from the below menu of options

- Take a **College Visit**
- Conduct a **Career Shadowing Experience**
- Participate in a **Class Service Project**
 - There will be service project options on and off campus for drivers and non-drivers
- Seniors were given a permission slip to transport themselves to one of the above options, with the exception of those who will ride the bus to school and participate in the on-campus service project. Permission slips are due back on March 15th. Students will be given a form to complete verifying their participating in one of the above activities.

March-August of Junior Year	Create a list of colleges you are considering and collect information. Have you included all possible choices? What information do you need? How can you get it? - All Juniors will have FREE access to Albert, which is an online service that allows students to answer practice ACT questions, and receive feedback on their answers.
- There are 215 questions on an ACT test.
- Albert will offer questions that span the various topics covered on the ACT. We encourage students to spread out their 215 to all of the various categories.

- Mrs. Sadowski is a professional ACT tutor. During the December and March 2 Hour Delays, she will teach students about the differences between what they are learning in class and what is on the test. She will also give them steps they can take to prepare to score as well as they can.

- The NVPO and SVPO will be hosting three opportunities to take a full length practice ACT for students. Taking advantage of any one of these practices tests will work.
- Students can skip this step if they take Mrs. Rhine's after school ACT prep course in the fall or spring.

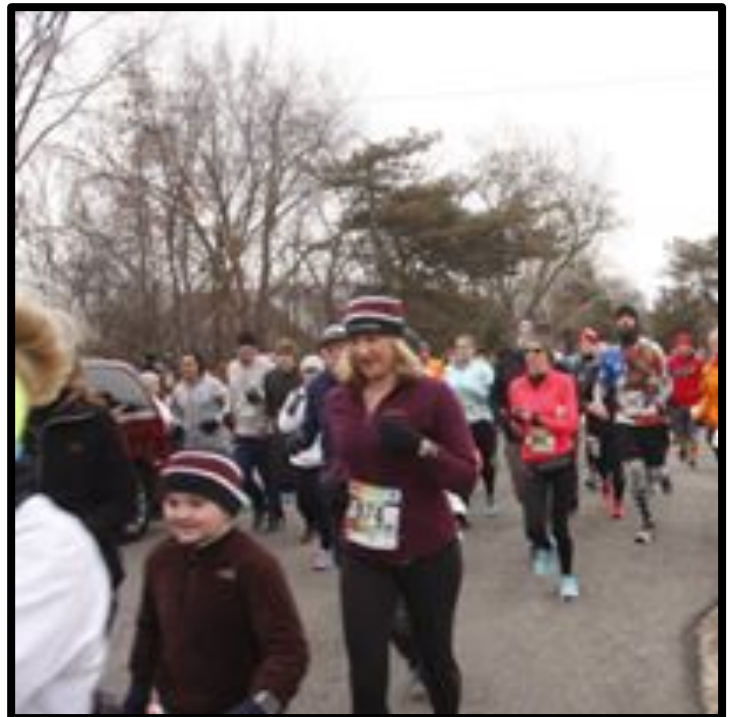
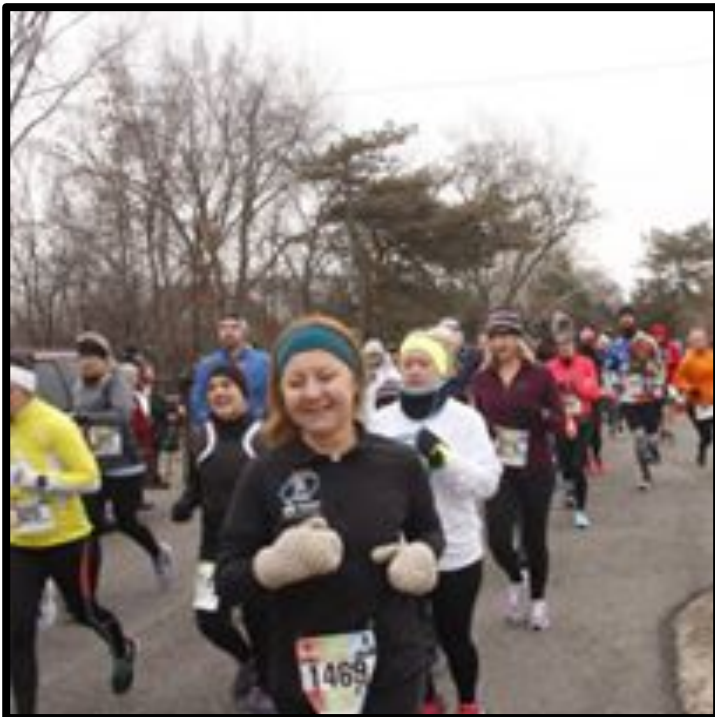


Hot Cocoa Run 2018

The attendance guideline

procedures are in compliance with the Ohio Revised Code. Also, review this section in the student handbook, which explains in detail what will be considered an **excused** absence.

Attendance Procedures:

- Please call the attendance office at 824-8710 to report an absence. We have voicemail so a call can be made to the office 24 hours a day.
- A written note must be presented upon the student's return to school, or the absence will be recorded as a truancy.
- If a student needs to miss school for a professional appointment (i.e. legal, medical, dental) they must bring a signed statement back



from the appointment to the attendance office otherwise the absence will not be excused until the note arrives.

- The (PCA) form must be filled out in advance of the day(s) absent. A parent must call or come in to request a Personal Convenience Absence form.
- If a student comes to school after 7:35 a.m. she/he must report to the attendance office before going to class.

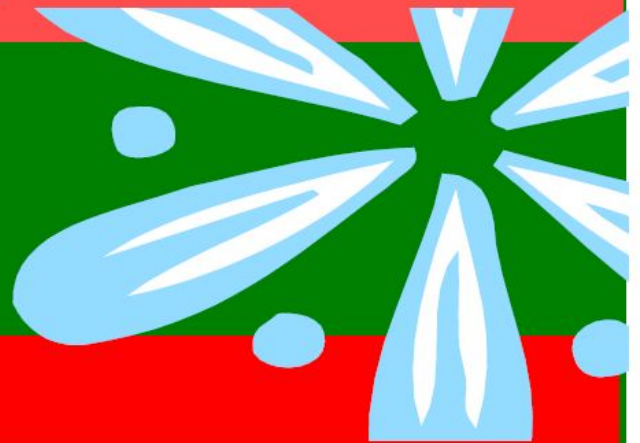

It's a new school year and time for a conversation about meals at school!

We are excited about the upcoming school year! We continue to offer food options that are not only healthy, but kid's favorites.

MySchoolBucks - We **strongly encourage** all parents and guardians to discuss meal options and responsible purchases with their children. Also, please consider using myschoolbucks.com as a tool for you, the parent/guardian, to review your child's purchases and manage their lunch account balance. There is no charge to set up an account and monitor your child's cafeteria purchases.

Breakfast - During the 2017-2018 school year, we will have several options available every day for breakfast. Let us provide your kiddos with a healthy breakfast daily! As a bonus, you get more time in the morning! Breakfast is offered at 9 of our 12 schools: Hillview, Maplewood, Stranahan, Sylvan, Whiteford, Arbor Hills, McCord, Northview and Southview.

Menus - The 2017-2018 menus will be available at www.sylvaniaschools.org after July 30, 2017. Our menu will be updated again after winter break.

No kid goes hungry - *We will never take food from a child in the lunch line. However, lunch and breakfast charges will be the responsibility of the student's parent or guardian and will be collected like other student fees.*

Meal account balances - Letters are sent home once a month if a student's lunch account balance is over \$20.00 in arrears. If the account is not brought current, the charges will then be applied to the student's Power School account and must be paid at the Treasurer's Office. In this instance, a letter is also mailed to the home address on record.

Meal accounts - In an attempt to make certain no student goes without breakfast or lunch, our system has been configured to allow students to charge full meals (**not** a la carte items) when they do not have food with them or money on their lunch account.

Charging is for emergencies - Our new charge system is required by the state of Ohio. It is intended to be used for the occasional time when a child does not have funds in their lunch account or does not have lunch money with them. *The intention of this system is **not** to create a revolving charge account.*

Set limitations - The student's meal account can have specific limitations set to accommodate the parent request(s) regarding food purchases and/or monetary limits. The food service staff is available to discuss these options at (419) 824-8655 or (419) 824-8511.

Need assistance? The application for free and reduced meals for the 2017-2018 school year should be available at: sylvaniaschools.org/our-school-district/administration/food-service after July 15, 2017. Paper applications will be available at school offices after July 30, 2016.

NOTE: Re-application is required each school year for all students.

We are committed to better nutrition and quality of foods while staying within the required guidelines. Please help us in our efforts to feed and serve students to make a difference. Thank you for your support in your child's nutrition and education and your continued support of our cafeteria program!! We are passionate about feeding and serving students to make a difference.
