Traditionally, sports are segregated by gender.

Charles Cuny, Superintendent, says,

"While we've managed to eliminate sex and gender segregation across many different fronts within the last decade, there is still one place remaining where men and women are strictly kept apart: sports"

Title IX is a federal act saying no matter your sex, you should be able to participate in any sport you choose.

"Our school is dictated by policy, we have to see how it's applied across the state of South Dakota," Mr. Cuny says.

Athletic Director, Mr. Arlo Provost, says according to policy, girls can play football because football isn't segregated by sex. Under the National Federation, boys can't play on the girls' volleyball team because of the net requirements. The net policy for the boys is six inches higher than the girls.

"So a boy playing girls' volleyball would have an unfair advantage," Mr. Provost says.

Policymakers keeps going back to the standard of the net being higher in boys' volleyball. That is why there has not been a boy to play on a girls' volleyball team.

"No one has broken that barrier yet," says Mr. Provost.

Playing with the Boys, authors, Eileen McDonagh and Laura Pappano, argue that there is no correlation between a person's gender and their ability to play sports. Rather, separating genders in sports only help shape an already sexist system in athletics. The New Zealand news organization Stuff says, "The argument that men are superior to women in sport is based only on statistical averages." So the question remains, is the athletic system across the United States inherently sexist or is gender segregation necessary in sports?
