
## Comprehensive School Counseling Program Vision

# Comprehensive School Counseling Program Elements



#### **Academics**

#### **Earning Credits**

- Passing a semester is ½ credit
- Exceptions: Driver Ed & Careers ¼ each
- Students must have a passing grade at the end of the semester to earn any credit in a class

#### **Promotion**

- You gain sophomore, junior, and senior status by passing classes and earning credits, not by getting a year older.
- 5 credits are needed to be a Sophomore, 11 to be a Junior, and 17 to be a Senior.

#### **Graduation Requirements**

- √ 4 years of English
  - Includes Speech
- √ 3 years of Math
  - Includes Algebra
  - Includes Geometry
- ✓ 2 years of Science
- ✓ 1 semester of Health
- ✓ 2 years of Fine/Applied Art

- ✓ 2 years of Soc. Studies
  - Includes Am. History
  - Includes Civics/Gov
- √ 1 semester of Cons Ed
  - Includes Economics or
  - Resource Management
- √ 4 years of PE (or waiver)
- ✓ 25 Total Credits needed

#### Course Load

- A normal load is 6 classes <u>plus PE and</u> <u>Study Hall</u>
- Research course options before selecting
  - If requests are fulfilled, students may not change their schedule
  - Students may NOT drop a class just because they don't like it or are failing it
  - Remember to choose carefully
- Students can only have 1 study hall

### What if I want to change my schedule?

Schedule changes are to be requested for serious educational reasons only.

- To meet graduation requirements
- To meet IEP requirements
- To meet scheduling requirements
- Failing or near failing first semester of a full-year course that is not required for graduation
- Excessive absences
- Medical Reasons

### Driver's Ed Eligibility

- Pass 8 classes over the previous two semesters
- Freshmen may not begin until 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter
- Freshman year, we will have to look at 8<sup>th</sup> grade grades
- Other considerations:
  - Birthday
  - Class space
  - Absences
  - Excellent disciplinary record
  - Failing academic courses

### Extra Curricular Eligibility

- Grades are checked weekly
- One failing grade in a single subject during any week will be eligible for up to 3 weeks
- One failing grade in a single subject for more than 3 weeks will be immediately <u>ineligible</u>
- More than one failing grade in multiple subjects in any week will be immediately <u>ineligible</u>
- More than 1 failure on a semester grade card will be immediately <u>ineligible</u> for entire following semester

## 4-Yr College Entrance Requirements

- 4 years of English
- 3-4 years of Math
- → 3 years of Science
- 3 years of Social Studies
- 2 years of Fine Arts or Foreign Language

\*These are general requirements for most 4-year colleges/universities. Check the specific school of interest for exact requirements.

## 2-Yr Colleges Entrance Requirements

- Students meeting GCMS graduation
   requirements are generally accepted into
   2-year colleges (Parkland, Heartland)
- Getting into the college does not guarantee that students qualify for college-level coursework
