

What is M.O.R.E

M.O.R.E stands for **Mobile Outreach Response & Engagement**.

The M.O.R.E. Program is a collaborative initiative involving the Erie County Sheriff's Office and Firelands Regional Medical Center, Counseling & Recovery Services that was launched in July 2023. This program's purpose is to provide rapid, community-based intervention and support to individuals who may frequently come into contact with law enforcement while experiencing severe behavioral health problems or crises. The M.O.R.E. Program includes a team of mental health professionals and law enforcement who collaboratively outreach in response to referrals received from community partners. Timely outreach is provided in various settings, such as homes and other community locations. The M.O.R.E. team can provide rapid triage, intervention, assessment, and linkage to ongoing behavioral health services.

Our Goal

The M.O.R.E Program will provide local individuals with treatment support through partnered and routine intensive case management intervention to reduce frequency of hospitalization, recidivism, and decompensation of an individual's mental health or co-morbid drug/alcohol use disorders.

What To Expect

Since its launch, there has been an increase in access to mental health services.

By providing outreach engagement services in the community settings, the program has strengthened community ties and increased awareness of mental health resources.

Whose Eligible

Individuals 18 years and older who are residents of Erie County and meet one of the following targeted populations:

- Persons with high/frequent involvement in the criminal justice system and severe mental illness.
- Persons with high/frequent involvement in the criminal justice system and drug/alcohol addiction or repeated evidence of drug/alcohol intoxication at the time of arrest or other law enforcement contact.
- Persons who have come into to contact with the criminal justice system, may not have severe mental illness or addiction, however, they show signs/symptoms and may benefit from outreach to learn more about available resources.
