• 1310/4002 Parental Involvement - Defer to Attorney

- Adds a reference to the new state law requirement that a school receive parental permission before allowing students to share sleeping quarters with a member of the other biological sex, other than an immediate family member, during any activity or event authorized by the school
- Updates the legal references

• 3210 Parental Inspection of and Objection to Instructional Materials

- o Clarifies that references to parent include legal guardian and certain other caregivers.
- Revises the process for parental review of materials to allow for an extension of time to provide the materials due to the volume or complexity of the request.

 through a catalog on the school's website homepage and that parents be allowed to identify any
 library books that their student is prohibited from borrowing.

3320 School Trips - Defer to Attorney

- In accordance with a new state law, prohibits students from sharing sleeping quarters with anyone
 of the other biological sex during a school trip unless (1) the member of the other biological sex is
 the student's immediate family member or (2) the parents
 - of all students sharing the sleeping quarters have provided written permission to the school.
- Updates the legal references.

3510 Religious-Based Exemptions from School Programs

Revises the policy to address new state law requirements that (1) a student be excused from specific classroom discussions, activities, or assigned readings that the student, parent, or guardian believes would impose a substantial burden on the student's religious beliefs or invade the student's privacy by calling attention to the student's religion; (2) to the extent practicable, students, parents, and guardians be notified in advance of upcoming discussions, activities, and readings; and (3) if excused from a discussion, activity, or reading, the student be provided an

alternative activity or assignment aligned with the standard course of study.

• 3620 Extracurricular Activities and Student Organizations - Defer to Attorney

Opening

Chairman Hammer called the meeting to order at 6:14 p.m. and welcomed all in attendance. Chairman Hammer opened the meeting with a moment of silence. Chairman Hammer then introduced a student from Lindley Park to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

Upon motion by Linda Cranford and seconded by Phillip Cheek, the board voted unanimously to approve the meeting agenda.

Closed Session

Under NC General Statute 143-318.11.A1, to prevent disclosure of information that is privileged or confidential pursuant to the law of this State or of the United States or not considered a public record within the Meaning of Chapter 132 of the General Statutes, upon motion by Melissa Calloway and seconded by Hilda DeCortez, the Board voted unanimously to enter closed session to discuss the District School Risk Management Plans (SRMP) at 6:18 p.m.

Upon motion by Michael Smith and seconded by Gidget Kidd, the board voted unanimously to reopen the regular session at 7:04 p.m.

Special Recognitions

- **A.** Mr. Adam Deathe, Asheboro/Randolph Chamber President, and Mr. Todd Dulaney, Community Member, shared information about Randolph Reads, a new collaboration with Asheboro businesses to make books accessible to children across the community. Mr. Deathe and Mr. Dulaney shared that Randolph Reads was born from a conversation with Dr. Woody about literacy and challenges getting students on reading level. Mr. Dulaney, Mr. Deathe along with the Asheboro/Randolph Chamber staff, developed the plan. To date, they have held three book drives resulting in a collection of several hundred books. Seven businesses are currently participating, with no cost to them. Each month, books will be restocked at the participating locations.
- **B.** Ms. Chandra Manning, Director of Communications & Talent Development, recognized Mr. Chris Burian as the Principal of the Year. Mr. Burian was selected for this honor by his peers across the district in recognition of his strong academic leadership. He is currently leading South Asheboro Middle School through a challenging project while also managing the school's daily operations.
- **C.** Ms. Chandra Manning, Director of Communications & Talent Development, presented Points of Pride, which featured a variety of student, staff, and district highlights. These included:
 - **Book Drive**: Lindley Park held the inaugural Marie C. Boone Legacy Library Book Drive and as a result, all 400 Lindley Park students received a new book for the 2025-2026 school year.
 - <u>Multilingual Family Night</u>: On September 2, 2025, Asheboro City Schools hosted the first Multilingual Family Night of the Year. Families connected with district and school ML staff learning about resources and supports for their children.
 - <u>Professional Development</u>: Before students returned to school on August 25, the Asheboro City Schools' staff were participating in professional development sessions focused on creating a strong sense of belonging for students and building coherence and consistency in the classrooms across the district.
 - <u>September Recognitions</u>: September is Attendance Awareness Month. Asheboro City Schools' social
 workers are working hard to spotlight students, staff, and schools who are showing up and making
 every day count.

Superintendent's Report

Dr. Woody shared the following:

- 1. An Incredible Start to the 2025–26 School Year We are nearly three weeks into the new school year, and we are encouraged by what we are seeing across our schools—clear routines, strong parent and student engagement, and significant enthusiasm from staff. Our theme this year is "Elevate to Excellence." We are reinforcing this theme through three pillars that guide our district approach: belonging, consistency, and coherence.
- 2. Learn to Swim Program This week, Asheboro City Schools partnered with the Asheboro YMCA to launch a new Learn to Swim initiative. Second grade students from Lindley Park were the first to participate, and all our Elementary schools will have their turn between now and December. Lessons are offered during the school day, and we thank our transportation department, student support office, principals, teachers, and especially the YMCA staff for making this possible.
- **3. Instructional Coaching and District Support -** We are re-engaging our coaching model this school year to provide clear, focused, and targeted support at every school. This includes structured opportunities for leaders to

reflect on data, student evidence, and assessments, and to develop strategies that help students tackle challenging content. Tonight, and again next month, you will see aspects of this work outlined in our continuous improvement plans.

- **4. Early Release Professional Development -** Next Wednesday, September 17, will be our first early release day of the school year. Students will dismiss at the scheduled time, and teachers will participate in professional development from 1:00–4:00 p.m. Elementary staff (PreK–5) will engage in district-led sessions, while secondary staff (6–12) will focus on school-based sessions. On our next early release day on October 15, these roles will switch. Thank you, Board of Education, for making these professional learning opportunities possible for our educators.
- **5. Attendance Awareness Month -** September is Attendance Awareness Month in Asheboro City Schools. Each day in school is an opportunity to learn something new, sharpen skills, build connections, and move closer to achieving dreams. It's very important for our staff and students to be in attendance every day.
- **6. Family Night Out & Athletic Boosters -** On Friday, September 26, we will partner with the City of Asheboro and our Global Innovation Center to host a Family Night Out in downtown Asheboro. Families are encouraged to enjoy a favorite restaurant, or shop, while also learning more about the Global Innovation Center and its services for all Asheboro City Schools families. Also on September 26, with no Asheboro High School football game scheduled, the Athletic Booster Club will sponsor a free student movie night at Lee J. Stone Stadium. The featured film will be *Remember the Titans*, generously sponsored by former City Manager John Ogburn and his wife Martha in honor of all former Blue Comet athletes and John's father, Jack Ogburn, one of the founding members of the Booster Club.
- **7. September 11th Observance -** Today marks 24 years since the tragic events of September 11, 2001. Throughout our schools and throughout the community, observances were held to honor the lives lost and to remind us of the importance of freedom.

Information, Reports, and Recommendations

A. Dr. Christina Kinley, Director of Accountability & Student Development, shared the 2024-2025 School Performance Grades and Growth Data. This included final information about End-of-Grade Assessments, End-of-Course Assessments, School Performance Grades and Growth, and Graduation Rates. Four out of eight of

- our schools met or exceeded growth and we have seen slight increases over the last three to four years in most subjects. We intend to improve those statistics with targeted instruction. Our 2025 graduation rate is 90.9%, which is three percent higher than the state average.
- **B.** Dr. Ana Floyd, Director of School Improvement & Professional Development, stated that the principal from each school would share their school's Continuous Improvement Plan (CIP). 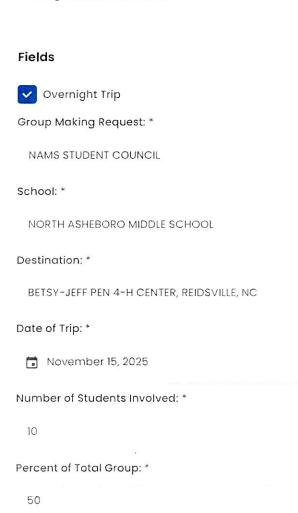

Special Comments/Response:

POLICY: FIELD TRIPS

When properly planned, supervised and evaluated, field trips can provide a valuable education experience. Indeed, it is often those events that are extraordinary, unique, or a departure from routine, which create the setting for significant retained learning.

All field trips require the prior approval of a school's principal. That Principal should know the reasons for the experience, the pre-trip work that has been done with the students and the specific objectives the sponsor hopes to accomplish and follow-up plans. It is the responsibility of the trip sponsor to review those matters with the school's principal. Because of the process we use for approval and because of the difficulty in scheduling of activity buses, sponsors need to seek approval as much in advance as possible.

Once trips are approved be the principal, requests will be sent to the central office where the superintendent or his designee will review them. Instructional merits of the trip will be considered and the transportation supervisor will determine whether vehicles/drivers are available on the desired date(s). Schools are encouraged to build a staff of building-level drivers, rather than rely on what might be available

Also keep the following regulations governing field trips in mind:

1.All overnight field trips must have prior written approval of the Superintendent.

2.All overnight and out-of-state field trips must have prior written approval of the Board of Education.

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In policy 3200, Selection of Instructional Materials, the board establishes a process for the selection of instructional materials to meet State Board of Education requirements and the educational goals of the board. That process provides an opportunity for parental input in the selection of materials.

The board recognizes that despite the opportunity to participate in the selection of materials, parents still may have concerns about instructional materials used in the school system. Thus, to further involve parents in the education of their children, the board also provides opportunities for parents to review instructional materials and a process for parents to use when they object to instructional materials.

For purposes of this policy, all references to "parent" include a parent, legal guardian, legal custodian, or other caregiver adult authorized to enroll a student under policy 4120, Domicile or Residence Requirements.

A. PARENTAL RIGHT TO INSPECT MATERIALS

Parents may review all instructional materials, as defined in policy 3200, Selection of Instructional Materials. Instructional materials do not include academic tests or assessments. Parents who would like to inspect and review instructional materials should make a request in writing to the principal identifying the instructional materials the parent is seeking to inspect. Within 10 business days of receiving the request, the principal shall either (1) provide access to the requested information or (2) provide an extension notice to the parent that, due to the volume or complexity of the request, access to the information will be provided no later than 20 business days from the date of the parent's request. Access will be provided by supplying the parent with a copy of the materials or by scheduling a mutually agreeable date and time for the parent to come into the school to review the materials. All materials used in reproductive health and safety education shall be available for review as provided in policy 3540, Comprehensive Health Education Program.

B. PARENTAL OBJECTION TO MATERIALS

Parents may submit an objection in writing to the principal regarding the use of particular instructional materials. The principal may establish a committee to review the objection. While input from the community may be sought, the board believes professional educators are in the best position to determine whether a particular instructional material is appropriate for the age and maturity of the students and for the subject matter being taught.

If the principal or the committee determines that any material violates constitutional or other legal rights of the parent or student, the principal or the committee shall either remove the material from instructional use or accommodate the particular student and parent. (For

Policy Code: 3210

religious-based objections, also see policy 3510, Religious-Based Exemptions from School Programs.) Before any material is removed, the principal or the committee shall ensure that the curriculum is still aligned with current statewide instructional standards and articulated from grade to grade. If an objection made by a parent or student is not based upon constitutional or legal rights, the principal or the committee may accommodate the objection after considering the effect on the curriculum; any burden on the school, teacher, or other students that the accommodation would create; and any other relevant factors. Books and other instructional materials may be removed from the school media collection only for legitimate educational reasons and subject to the limitations of the First Amendment. The decision of the committee or principal may be appealed to the superintendent. The decision of the superintendent may be appealed to the board.

Any request by a student's parent that the student be prohibited from borrowing certain library books will automatically be granted. The request must be made in writing to the principal and identify by title the library book(s) that the student may not borrow. For purposes of this policy, library books are defined as all instructional materials, other than textbooks, that are available at a school, whether in the school library or in a classroom or other space, for independent use by students and school personnel outside of the standard course of study for any grade or course. The titles of all library books at a school may be accessed through a searchable web-based catalog displayed on the homepage of the school's website.

The superintendent shall develop the necessary administrative procedures to implement this policy.

The board and the school system will be based on the current statewide instructional standards. The board and the school administrators will exercise their authority to select appropriate materials and teach the curriculum in an effective manner. The board supports the free exercise of religion and prohibits discrimination on the basis of religion. While students are expected to participate in all required courses and school activities, the board recognizes that at times a student or a student's parent or guardian may object to a specific classroom discussion, activity, or assigned reading. This policy is designed to provide students, parents, and guardians with a process for seeking a religious-based exemption for a student from a specific classroom discussion, activity, or assigned reading. To the extent practicable, students, parents, and guardians will be notified in advance of upcoming classroom discussions, activities, and assigned readings.

A student, parent, or guardian may petition to exempt the student from participation in a specific classroom discussion, activity, or assigned reading that the student, parent, or guardian believes would impose a substantial burden on the student's religious beliefs or invade the student's privacy by calling attention to the student's religion. Any request for exemption should be submitted to the superintendent or designee in accordance with the following guidelines.

- 1.Á The request must be in writing.
- 2.Á The request must specify the discussion, activity, or reading and explain how it would impose a substantial burden on the student's religious beliefs or invade the student's privacy by calling attention to the student's religion.
- 3.Á The request may suggest a proposed alternate activity or study.

The superintendent or designee shall review the request in accordance with any constitutional or statutory standards and shall accommodate the request as required by law. If accommodation is not required by law, the superintendent or designee may choose to accommodate such a request after weighing factors, such as the interest of the child, the impact on other students, and the availability of alternative activities or materials. An appeal of the decision may be made through the student grievance procedure.

If a student is excused from a classroom discussion, activity, or assigned reading, the student will be provided an alternative activity or assignment aligned with the standard course of study.
