



Ms. Sandra Spivey Ayers opened the meeting at 6:04 p.m.

Ms. Spivey Ayers provided details on State Allotments. Historical allotment formulas were reviewed to show the changes in state funding from 2009-2010, 2015-2016 and 2023-2024.

Classroom Teacher allotments are provided in a position allotment from the state. Ms. Spivey Ayers reviewed the formula used to allocate classroom teacher positions across our schools. Additional classroom teacher positions are funded through local and Title I sources. Each year, Ms. Carla Freemyer and Ms. Spivey Ayers prepare the individual school teacher projections. This process is used to ensure we are allocating our resources adequately across the district.

Certain program state allotment formulas are capped. Academically Gifted is capped at 4% of Average Daily Membership where we have 7% of our students receiving these services. Exceptional Children is capped at 13% of Average Daily Membership where we have 17% of our students receiving these services. Local funds are used to supplement the state funding in these areas.

There will be another Budget Planning Session on April 11th. The Board of Education will be approving the amount of Current Expense and Capital Outlay Appropriation we are asking of our County Commissioners for the 2024-2025 school year. The Board will also vote on the rate of the Supplemental Tax.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:08 p.m.

Opening

Chairman Smith called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. and welcomed all in attendance. Chairman Smith opened the meeting with a moment of silence. Chairman Smith then invited students from Guy B. Teachey Elementary to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

Upon motion by Phillip Cheek and seconded by Gus Agudelo, the board unanimously approved the meeting agenda.

Special Recognitions

- **A.** Ms. Ann Evans, Principal of Guy B. Teachey Elementary School, presented the School Spotlight titled *The Great Kindness Challenge*. The challenge is meant to empower students to create a culture of kindness and compassion within the school. The students were given a Great Kindness Challenge checklist of things to do to show kindness toward others. The students were encouraged to complete as many acts of kindness as possible at school and to acknowledge other students who were showing acts of kindness with thank you notes, letters, etc.
- **B.** Ms. Ann Evans, Principal of Guy B. Teachey Elementary recognized Oakhurst Baptist Church as their Community Partner. Ms. Evans shared that volunteers from Oakhurst support the students and staff at Guy B. Teachey by providing staff luncheons and donating various items to the school for the students throughout the school year. Ms. Evans introduced Dr. Roberts and Mr. Lawrence from Oakhurst to recognize them.
- **C.** Ms. Linda Brown, RCC Strategic Planning and Development Officer, shared an update of the Randolph Community College (RCC) Strategic Plan process. Ms. Brown shared the following:
 - RCC is considered an economic engine of Randolph County.
 - RCC was ranked number one among community colleges in North Carolina for 2023.
 - RCC served 46,000 students over the last five years.
 - There are four large companies coming to Randolph County which will bring thousands of new jobs:
 Boom, Toyota, Vinfast and Wolfspeed.
 - RCC will Focus on three areas: Staying relevant, careers, and staying committed to partners and the community.
 - RCC's Strategic Plan will align with schools across Randolph County.
 - Projects in progress and planned changes at RCC.
 - RCC wants public input by attending a public meeting, email, or complete a survey on the RCC website.
 - RCC will keep the community informed of the progress in their Strategic Plan.

D. Ms. Mikayla Smith, Communications Specialist, presented Points of Pride which featured a variety of student, staff, and district highlights. These included:

Welcome Center Open House

We held our Welcome Center Open House on February 15. Many community members, staff and students attended, and the media covered the event. Our Welcome Center is now officially open and has been hosting sessions.

Signature School - South Asheboro Middle School

At this year's annual Piedmont Triad Education Consortium (PTEC) annual meeting and breakfast we honored South Asheboro Middle school as our Signature School.

Youth Art Month at the Randolph Arts Guild

On March 4th we celebrated Youth Art Month at the Randolph Arts Guild with an art show that featured artwork from students across the district.

Family Engagement

Our schools have been hosting very successful family engagement nights where families take time to engage and interact with one another.

Elementary School Happenings

There are exciting things happening in the elementary schools, including field trips, Science Day, Spanish Spelling Bee, an apparel donation, and Read Across America Week.

Middle School Happenings

NC FFA Middle Grades Rally, North Asheboro Middle School chorus received superior rating at the NC Middle School Choral Music Performance Adjudication; nine students from South Asheboro Middle School received a Superior Rating at the MiddleFest Choral Festival; and the Battle of the Books competition winner was South Asheboro Middle School.

AHS Happenings

Students from universities come to Asheboro High School weekly to tutor students, students visit colleges, AFJROTC cadets and instructors received an Exceeds Standards Rating in their Unit Review, the Jazz Ensemble traveled to UNC Charlotte for the UNCC Jazz Festival.

Combined Choral Concert and Piano Dedication

On February 27th, Asheboro High School held a combined choral concert with performances from Asheboro High School, North Asheboro Middle School, and South Asheboro Middle School. Following the performances there was a reception to celebrate the rebuilding of Asheboro High School's Steinway grand piano, which was originally donated by the McCrary Foundation in the mid-1950s.

#InnovateACS

- **A.** Ms. Carla Freemyer, Chief of Human Resources, shared a Human Resources update which included district attrition numbers, teacher recruitment, staff recognitions, ESS substitute information, Professional Growth Opportunities, and the Teacher Working Conditions Survey.

Chairman Michael Smith called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.

Dr. Woody, Superintendent, and Mr. Michael Smith, Chairman, extended a welcome to all in attendance. Dr. Woody recognized the members of the board and staff and thanked our legislators for taking the time out of their busy schedules to attend the meeting.

Chairman Smith led with a "thank you" from the Board of Education to our legislators. Chairman Smith emphasized how much we sincerely appreciate the legislators for listening to us and hearing our concerns. The Board of Education sees the changes taking place for education and knows the legislators hear us. Each legislator was provided with a list of specific items that we are thankful for as well as a list of continued concerns. The meeting focused on the good things that are happening in Asheboro City Schools thanks to the support of the legislators.

Dr. Woody shared that students from Asheboro High School would be sharing their experiences with programs offered at Asheboro High School and how beneficial those programs are to them.

Ms. Barb Skelly, Director of Exceptional Children, introduced Exploring Careers at Asheboro High School, which partners students in our extended content classroom with students in regular education arts and physical education classes. Students Sam Delvega and Savannah Harn shared about their experience in theater class. They demonstrated a brief performance

from a scene from Frozen that they are performing in May. The students gave their autographs to all who attended.

Ms. Sarah Beth Cox, Director of Career & Technical Education, introduced our CTE program's apprenticeship and internship opportunities with local businesses. Student Eric Brown shared about his apprenticeship and mentoring with Summey Engineering Associates. Student Romina Martinez Lopez shared how her design course led to opportunities to design models for a local business and created an opening for a career in architecture.

Student Kady Jefferson shared her journey as a student that led to her desire to be a teacher. She discussed the new dual enrollment program, TEACH, that she is enrolling in, and was pleasantly surprised to learn that she was the inspiration for the program.

VISION STATEMENT

Asheboro City Schools engages students in educational experiences and opportunities that elevate lifelong learning, cultivate exceptional thinkers, and empower students to design their own futures.

MISSION STATEMENT

Every student will have equitable access to engaging learning that transforms life outcomes and prepares them to be collaborative, competitive, and successful in our global world.

PURPOSE OF LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

- To educate, inform, and communicate the needs of the Asheboro City Schools with key legislative leaders at the local, state, and federal levels on a regular basis;
- To develop positive relationships with key legislative leaders; and
- To stay abreast of current legislative issues and develop awareness among key legislative leaders of their potential impact on the Asheboro City Schools.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Local Control—We believe that a system of excellent schools is governed by a local board of education representative of the community and vested in the interests of its students and citizens.

Adequate funding—We believe that a system of excellent schools provides quality learning opportunities for all students, and the state should provide sufficient funding and resources to meet the requirement of providing all children with the opportunity for a sound, basic education.

Support for public schools—We believe that public education in North Carolina offers the promise of equal educational opportunities no matter race, religion, or ability; high standards; public accountability; and is a benefit to society by teaching democratic principles and shared values. **2024 Legislative Priorities**

Recruitment and Retainment of Top Talent – As the candidate pool for educators continues to decrease, we implore legislators and the General Assembly to help our industry recruit and retain highly qualified school personnel

to educate future generations. To help us recruit and retain quality staff needed in all facets of public school work, we encourage:

- Reinstate full license reciprocity with other states without testing and other requirements.
- Reinstating retiree health coverage for all school employees who begin work on or after January 1, 2021.
- Reinstatement of advanced degree supplements to reflect the value of higher education attainment for school leadership and classroom success.

Adequate and Equitable Resources for All Schools and Students – Asheboro City Schools stands firmly committed to providing each student with the support, resources, and tools needed for individual success. As such, we strongly feel the General Assembly should prioritize the expansion of additional resources to k-12 public schools to ensure all NC students have the support they need to succeed post-pandemic and in the years ahead. We are deeply concerned when funding and resources are diverted from public schools to private and religious schools that have no or limited accountability measures in place.

- We would like to see the approval of hardship waivers for the K-3 class size mandate for districts that
 cannot hire enough teachers or provide adequate space to open additional classrooms as required. As we
 continue to navigate class size transitions, we also encourage our legislators to consider amending the law
 on class size caps in K-3 to eliminate the district-wide averages.
- Technology, Technology Staffing, and Cybersecurity Technology is a cornerstone in all modern educational
 organizations. Digital technology resources and devices are essential to provide access to curricula and
 opportunities that elevate learning. The Federal eRate program provides funding for infrastructure and
 connectivity but does not provide for staffing, devices, or cybersecurity measures that support and safeguard
 business systems, user data, and daily operations. The current state technology allotment does not provide
 adequate funding to sustain and replace devices, purchase required platforms/subscriptions, or provide
 competitive salaries for technology support staff.
- Textbook Funding (Community College) With increased opportunities for students at the community college, our challenge is paying for textbooks, especially with the frequent textbook edition changes, the number of textbooks required to purchase per class and the online access codes now required that can't be issued to other students each year. Almost 3/3 of our textbook allotment for the entire district is taken up by RCC courses that only account for 150 students of our 4390 students.

School Safety – Children are society's most precious gift and families trust us to protect their children while in our care. Safety in schools is paramount to doing just that. Recent events across the nation highlight the need for dedicated funding that provides for security measures to safeguard our students and staff. Grant funding through the Center for Safer Schools is appreciated but does not provide for improvements and upgrades needed across all school campuses. Directed funding allocations are necessary to maintain ongoing safety needs.

Mental Health – We ask our legislature to continue to fund and advocate for additional mental health services in our community. There are not enough resources available to help students and families in need. Teachers and administrators are not equipped to provide appropriate support and services to students and families in crisis.

Support School Performance Grades recommendations by NCDPI – We support the proposed changes to school performance grades used to report and measure school performance. The new "multi-measure model of school performance" would be built upon four pillars: academics, progress, readiness, and opportunity; providing individual school letter grades for each area. We believe this will present a truer picture of the progress made by our schools in increasing student achievement and preparing students for the future. The current grading scale (20% growth, 80% proficiency) frames many of our schools and local communities in a negative light, thus affecting the economic climate. Additionally, we would appreciate a revision to the definition of a low-performing school. Schools that "meet expected growth" should not be labeled as "low-performing."

Preservation of Fund 8

These funds are awarded or donated to Asheboro City Schools for specific purposes or programs. These funds include JROTC, NC Pre-K, and other program-specific funds related to activities that are provided by Asheboro City

Schools. Medicaid reimbursements are also included in Fund 8. These funds should not be shared with Charter Schools.

Continued Priorities

NC Pre-K— We continue to support increased funding to serve additional three and four-year-olds in five-star pre-kindergarten programs. The state-funded pre-kindergarten program – NC Pre-K – provides high-quality early education to North Carolina's most at-risk children. Studies have consistently found that children who participate in the program emerge better prepared for school and more likely to read at grade level by third grade than their at-risk peers. Lawmakers should continue to expand and fully fund this program. Additionally, we strongly believe NC Pre-K should move back under the Department of Public Instruction to ensure a seamless transition between early childhood learning and K-12 public education. (In Asheboro City Schools, we spend \$350,000 from our supplemental tax to fund the Early Childhood Development Center.)

Calendar flexibility — We ask our local legislators to consider an amendment to the calendar law that allows for the same calendar flexibility granted to charter and low-performing schools. We believe by amending the calendar law to provide more flexibility in the start and end dates, we will be able to optimize retention, minimize disruption, and allow concepts and ideas to be fully developed and absorbed.

Standardized accountability for all publicly-funded schools – We believe all schools receiving tax-payer dollars should be held to the same accountability measures regarding student performance, teacher qualifications, calendar flexibility, curriculum standards, school accreditation requirements, and reporting requirements. We strongly encourage the General Assembly to "level the playing field" so that families can make fair comparisons among all publicly-funded schools including private, religious, charter, and virtual schools.

Dr. Woody stated he would like to take the legislators on a tour of the new Welcome Center and Robotics Lab at the conclusion of the meeting.

In closing, Chairman Michael Smith thanked the legislators for being in attendance. Chairman Smith expressed appreciation for the work our legislators are doing in Raleigh on behalf of public schools and asked for their continued support.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:01 a.m.

LEASE AGREEMENT

COUNTY OF RANDOLPH

THIS LEASE AGREEMENT ("Lease"), made and entered into as of the last date set forth in the notary acknowledgements below, by and between the STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA, a body politic and corporate, hereinafter referred to as "Lessor" and ASHEBORO CITY SCHOOLS BOARD OF EDUCATION, hereinafter referred to as "Lessee";

WITNESSETH:

THAT WHEREAS, authority to approve and execute this lease agreement was delegated to the Department of Administration by resolution adopted by the Governor and Council of State on the 1st day of September, 1981; and as amended on September 8, 1999 and December 7th, 1999, and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto have mutually agreed to the terms of this lease agreement as hereinafter set out,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the rental received and the terms, covenants and conditions set forth herein, Lessor does hereby rent, lease and demise unto Lessee for and during the term and under the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, that portion of the Leased Premises being more particularly described below as the "Lease Premises."

THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF THIS LEASE ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. <u>Lease Premises</u>. The "Lease Premises" contains ± 0.15 acre located in the North American Parking Area of the NC Zoological Park at 4401 Zoo Parkway, Asheboro, Randolph County, North Carolina and being further described on the floor plan appended hereto and incorporated herein as Attachment 1.
- 2. <u>Term.</u> The term of this Lease shall be for a period of six (6) months commencing on the 1st day of March, 2024 or as soon thereafter as the Lease Premises is ceded to the Lessee and terminating on the 31st day of August, 2024 (the "Term").
- 3. Rent. The Lessee shall pay to the Lessor as rental for the Lease Premises the sum of \$1.00 for the term.
- 4. <u>Use of Premises</u>. The Premises may only be used by Lessee for the operation of a science based high school and for no other purpose. Lessee expressly covenants and agrees that should the Premises cease to be used for such purposes, or other uses be made without the express written consent of Lessor, then this Lease shall become null and void, and Lessor shall be entitled to immediate possession of the Premises. Lessee agrees that the number of people occupying the Premises shall never exceed the number permitted by State and local fire and building codes.
- 5. <u>Condition of Premises</u>. Lessor agrees to deliver the Premises to Lessee in its present condition. Except as otherwise expressly provided herein, Lessee acknowledges that the Premises

is being delivered "as is", that Lessee has performed preliminary investigations and reviews and has concluded on its own judgment that the Premises are suitable for the purposes intended, without any representations or warranties of any kind (including, without limitation, any express or implied warranties of merchantability, fitness or habitability) from Lessor or any agent of Lessor. Lessees's entry into possession shall constitute conclusive evidence that as of the date thereof the Premises were in good order and satisfactory condition.

6. <u>Improvements, Alterations and Changes</u>. Lessee shall not erect or install any signs or other advertising media upon the Premises without the prior written consent of the Lessor. Lessee shall not make any alterations, changes, renovations or improvements to the Premises, structural or otherwise, without the prior written consent of Lessor. Any alteration, restoration or improvement of the Premises shall be made by Lessee at its sole cost and expense and shall comply with all applicable governmental laws, rules, ordinances and regulations. Prior to the commencement of any alteration, renovation or improvement of the Premises, Lessee shall submit plans for the intended work to Lessor for written approval by the State Construction Office, a division of the North Carolina Department of Administration, the Department of natural and Cultural Resources and to such other agency or agencies designated by Lessor.

7. Operation, Maintenance and Utilities.

- 7.1 <u>Operation and Maintenance</u>. Lessee shall be solely responsible for all costs and expenses associated with the operation, maintenance and repair of the Premises, and shall at all times during the Term keep and maintain the Premises in good order and repair and in a clean and safe condition.
- 7.2 <u>Utilities</u>. Lessee shall be responsible for all costs and expenses associated with utilities serving the Premises.
- 8. <u>Casualty</u>. If the Lease Premises be destroyed by fire or other casualty without fault of the Lessee, this Lease shall immediately terminate.
- 9. <u>Surrender of Premises</u>. Upon termination of this Lease, Lessee will remove all school related structures and peaceably surrender the Lease Premises in as good order and condition as when received, reasonable use and wear and damage by fire, war, riots, insurrection, public calamity, by the elements, by act of God, or by circumstances over which Lessee had no control or for which Lessor is responsible pursuant to this Lease, excepted.
- 10. <u>Indemnity</u>. Lessee agrees to indemnify and save harmless Lessor from and against any and all loss, damage, claim, demand, liability, or expense including reasonable attorney fees by reason of damage to person or property of Lessor or its officers, agents, employees, guests, invitees, or any other person in or near the Premises, which may arise or be claimed to have arisen as a result of the occupancy or use of the Premises by Lessee, except where such loss or damage arises from the willful or negligent misconduct of Lessor, its agents or employees. Further, Lessee specifically agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Lessor from and against any and all loss, damage, claims, demand, liability, or expense, including reasonable attorney fees, by reason of damage to any person or property arising out of the installation, operation, repair, maintenance, inspection, or

removal by Lessee, its agents or employees of its Improvements from the Premises. Lessee shall further indemnify Lessor against all costs, expenses, liabilities, losses, damages, injunctions, suits, fines, penalties, claims, and demands, including reasonable attorney fees arising out of its breach, violation, or default of any of the covenants or provisions of this Lease.

- 11. <u>Holdover</u>. In the event Lessee remains in possession of the Lease Premises after the expiration of the Term and without the execution of a new lease, Lessee shall occupy the Lease Premises as a tenancy at sufferance subject to all of the conditions of this Lease insofar as consistent with such a tenancy. However, either party shall give not less than sixty (60) days written notice to terminate the tenancy.
- 12. <u>Assignment. Sublease. Binding Effect.</u> This Lease may not be assigned or the Lease Premises sub-leased by Lessee, in whole or in part, without the express written approval of Lessor. Subject to the foregoing, this Lease shall be binding upon and enforceable against, and shall inure to the benefit of, Lessor and Lessee and their respective, legal representatives, successors and permitted assigns.
- 13. <u>Prohibition on Gifts</u>. North Carolina General Statute §133-32 and Executive Order 24, as applicable, prohibit the offer to, or acceptance by, any employee of Lessor of any gift from anyone with a contract with Lessor, or from any person seeking to do business with Lessor. By execution of this Lease, Lessee attests, for its entire organization, including its employees or agents, that it is not aware that any such gift has been offered, accepted, or promised by any employees of its organization.
- 14. <u>Smoking Restrictions</u>. Lessee shall enforce within the Building smoking regulations established pursuant to North Carolina General Statute §130A-493 and any future legislation which restricts smoking.
- 15. <u>Authority</u>. Each person executing this Lease on behalf of Lessee does hereby represent and warrant that, if applicable: (a) Lessee is duly organized and in good standing in the State of its organization and, if different, qualified to do business and in good standing in the State of North Carolina, (b) Lessee has full lawful right and authority to enter into this Lease and to perform all of its obligations hereunder, and (c) each person signing this Lease on behalf of Lessee is duly and validly authorized to do so.
- 16. <u>Relationship Between Parties</u>. Nothing in this Lease shall be construed to render Lessor in any way or for any purpose a partner, joint venturer, or associate in any relationship with Lessee other than that of Lessor and Lessee, nor shall this Lease be construed to authorize either to act as agent for the other.
- 17. <u>Applicable Law</u>. This Lease shall be governed by, construed under and interpreted and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of North Carolina, regardless of conflict of law principles.
- 18. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This instrument contains the entire agreement between the parties, and no statement, premise, inducement, representation or prior agreement which is not contained in

this written Lease shall be valid or binding.

- 19. <u>Amendment</u>. No amendment, modification, alteration or revision of this Lease shall be valid and binding unless made in writing and signed by Lessee and Lessor.
- 20. <u>Construction of Language</u>. The terms "lease," "lease agreement" or "agreement" shall be inclusive of each other, and also shall include renewals, extensions, or modifications of this Lease. Words of any gender used in this Lease shall be held to include any other gender, and words of the singular shall be held to include the plural and the plural to include the singular when the sense requires. The section or paragraph headings and the titles are not a part of this Lease and shall have no effect upon the construction and interpretation of any part hereof.
- 21. <u>Terms</u>. Capitalized terms used in this Lease shall have the meanings ascribed to them at the point where first defined, irrespective of where their use occurs, with the same effect as if the definitions of such terms were set forth in full and at length every time such terms are used.
- 22. <u>Effect of Waiver or Forbearance</u>. No covenant or condition of this Lease can be waived except by written consent of the parties hereto. A waiver of any covenant or condition on one occasion shall not be deemed a waiver of said covenant or condition on any subsequent occasion unless such fact is specifically stated in the waiver. Forbearance or indulgence by Lessor in any regard whatsoever shall not constitute a waiver of any covenant or condition to be performed by Lessee, and until Lessee has completely performed all covenants and conditions of this Lease, Lessor shall be entitled to invoke any remedy available to Lessor under this Lease or any law or equity despite such forbearance or indulgence.
- 23. <u>Survival</u>. All obligations accruing prior to expiration of the term of this Lease shall survive the expiration or other termination of this Lease.
- 24. <u>Lessor's Remedies Cumulative</u>. The rights and remedies of Lessor specified in this Lease shall be cumulative and in addition to any other rights and/or remedies otherwise available, whether or not specified in this Lease.
- 25. <u>Severability</u>. In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Lease shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision hereof and this Lease shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.
- 26. <u>Construction</u>. No provision of this Lease shall be construed against or interpreted to the disadvantage of any party by any court or other governmental or judicial authority by reason of such party's having or being deemed to have prepared or imposed such provision.



- Outer shell is assembled and installed with zip ties to complete assembly








Configuration

- Drones must be fully configured before taking flight
- Betaflight configurator software enables calibration of components
- Speed and agility of the drone is fully customizable
- Each drone can be configured independently with specialized settings and maneuvers



Flight School




- 10x10x20 Netted Arena
- Pilots are outside the arena at all times
- Orqa FPV.Ctrl Controllers are calibrated for each drone
- Two position sticks provide vertical and horizontal control
- Special maneuvers such as "Turtle Mode" must be learned by pilots



Gameplay

- Up to 10 Members on each team including a Captain, Pilots, Mechanics, Engineers, and Programmers
- 5 pilots on deck for each team during a match
- Keeper, Sweeper, Center, Forward, & Striker Drones
- Only the Striker can score goals
- Time is allowed between sets for recalibration and repairs






Competition

- 3 sets per match
- Double elimination
