

Food Service News

Madison Local School District Food Service Department is continuing to provide FREE meals to ALL students through the end of the school year; courtesy of ODE and USDA. Milk or extras that your student wants, are NOT free. Please make sure funds are in your student's account for these needs. To place funds onto your student(s) account, go to the Food Service tab on the school website, and click on the PaySchools box. It will prompt you to set up and/or you can log into your PaySchools account. You can set up options for your student to have automatic payments placed in their account, track their meals, and set up notices to be sent to you when funds are low.

Through the Continuing Appropriations Act, 2021 and Other Extensions Act, USDA authorized an extension of the Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) cards. These are for the Free & Reduced students that fall into three criteria: online learning, remote learning or quarantined. The Free & Reduced students that are doing in-person instruction are not eligible because they receive their meals at the school. Additional information about this can be found online at jfs.ohio.gov/ofam/p-ebt.stm.

Online remote students can continue to sign up to pick-up their weekly meals on Mondays. Supporting students' mental health with speaker Terrance Talley



As part of our Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) program, students had the opportunity to engage in a virtual assembly with speaker Terrance Talley! Mr. Talley has been traveling around the country for over seven years speaking to youth about facing uphill emotional battles. Even though Mr. Talley was not in person, he spoke to our building live as our students watched through a video link in their classrooms. Mr. Talley shared past experiences and stories that directly related to the challenges our students face while also teaching them that there is still hope, and better times are in the future. Mr. Talley also reminded students that

despite the emotions they face, they are not alone and that there are teachers, friends, and relatives who are available to reach out to for support!

Teaching students the danger of vaping

Deputy Gary Kiener from the Richland County Sheriff's Office recently spoke to all of our students to inform and warn them of the dangerous effects that vaping can have on the body. Vaping is a way of smoking in which electronic devices simulate cigarette or cigar smoking using aerosolized vapor instead of smoke. Deputy Kiener shared with our students the numerous toxic chemicals that are linked to lung disease and the lung injuries that can occur. We are thankful for the partnership and support of our local Sheriff's Office and Deputy Kiener!

Due to our large gymnasium and the ability to socially distance students, students attended an assembly with music artist Beacon. This was another support for our students as part of our Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) program. was able to engage and lift up our students in a positive way!

Raising student achievement

In the month of April we will begin administering the required state assessments in English Language Arts, Math, and Science in our building. Through the completion of state assessments it is important not only for our students to have the opportunity to perform their best on the assessments, but also for parents to have an accurate picture of how their child achieves in relation to benchmarks set for all students in the state of Ohio. To support students to develop healthy habits of focusing their skills during test taking through achieving this "Feat" (Focus, Effort, Answer all parts, Tools). Additionally we have been



measuring student growth through the school year through the use of the district's universal screener in English Language Arts and Math called STAR 360. We appreciate the support from parents in the past and look forward to continuing to work together to help our students do their best on the test!

Madison Early Childhood Learning Center

MECLC started implementing Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) in our Preschool program. Students earn leadership tickets for a weekly prize drawing. They also receive verbal praises, class awards, and other material awards when they follow the school matrix. The school matrix encompasses three rules - Be Kind, Be Safe, and Be Responsible. The school age program will begin to implement PBIS in the spring. The school age students are looking forward to earning class parties as a



team reward, and helping the younger children at MECLC as school role models.

We will begin to enroll for our summer school age program on May 1st for Kindergarten – 6th grade students. This is a full time only summer program, \$110/week, and

all meals are included. School age teachers are degreed and licensed in education. Students will attend field trips and participate in the summer library reading program. The Community Action for Capable Youth (CACY) provides a summer program for our school age students on bully prevention, self-esteem, and building confidence. Special Services Resource and Support Center

Greetings from the Madison Special Services Resource and Support Center (SSRSC)

As mentioned in the previous newsletter, The SSRSC is here to help you navigate in the world of Special Education. We also want to make you aware that the district, with assistance from the State's Health and Wellness funding, is offering a variety of professional mental health and social emotional services for those in the school community. These services are often called "wrap around" services because they can include practices that may happen after school or in the home along with time spent with students in the school setting. In partnership with three area mental health agencies, the district is offering the following services to students:

- 1. Through Catalyst Life Services, the district has contracted for a licensed school social worker who spends 20 hours a week in the district's buildings. The school social worker provides a host of professional counseling services such as grief counseling and anxiety coping skills training. Lastly, she also provides professional development for staff in social emotional learning and mental health practices.
- Through Family Life Counseling, students can be referred for professional coun-2. seling and/or the restorative practices program, including mediation. This program assists students with conflict resolution within the school setting.
- 3. Through Silver Linings Group, students are referred for intensive professional behavioral interventions. These interventions may include services with a licensed behavioral therapist or behavior technician.

If you feel that your child would benefit from any of the services listed above, please contact the SSRSC or the building principal or school counselor for more information.

Madison South Preschool

Madison South Preschool got a refresh over Winter Break! The entire preschool was painted a beautiful sage green color and it has really impacted the overall look and feel of the preschool area within the building. We look forward to the time when we can host parents in our preschool area to see the updates!

In addition to our Ohio Bird Sanctuary partnership, beginning in February the Preschool will be partnering with SNAP-Ed through Ohio State University. Every other week, students will participate in a 20 minute virtual learning experience to discuss nutrition and healthy choices that align with pre-school curriculum. The short sessions will contain a lesson about healthy choices, contain a physical activity, and a readaloud story that correlates with the lesson. This program will also provide supplemental nutrition information (handouts, recipes, magazines) to send home for the families. Hopefully, next year we will be able to provide these learning experiences in person.

For those students that will be age-ready to attend Kindergarten next school year, a preschool team member will be reaching out to discuss the transition process to ensure that our preschool students are ready and have the tools for a successful year of Kindergarten. 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Book Walk



We have created a book walk through the woods for our students! When the weather is nice enough, teachers have created а walking trail through the wooded por-

tion of South's property with the story <u>The Recess Queen</u> posted at different points throughout the walk. Teachers lead their students through the trail, reading the story along the way. We are excited for the students to be able to enjoy some fresh air and nature while also learning as well!

District Maintenance Building and Grounds

As winter grinds along so do the district maintenance plow crews. We utilize five plow trucks and have spread over 40,000 pounds of rock salt this season so far! Besides the plowing and salting, the two general maintenance men and the district electrician have completed 406 work orders since the beginning of the school year. Among other things, they performed plumbing, carpentry, and electrical repairs in all seven of our district buildings. These employees work very hard to keep our district buildings and grounds in the best shape possible. Some of the bigger projects completed in the last few months were the final sale and transfer of the Jesse Beer building, which had served our district since 1935. We also had an auction of miscellaneous, obsolete school supplies and equipment. Between the two auctions the District netted about \$75,000. We also completed a big roof repair above the Work and Family labs at the High School, as well as finished the final steps to prepare for a roof replacement of the original deck (1962) above the High School offices.

There, they play different themed games and activities with other students and staff members. This past month, students enjoyed playing Penguin Waddle, "Snowball" Fight, noodle tag, and climbing the rock wall. We can't wait to celebrate and reward another group of students next month!





Technology Tips from the Madison Tech Department

Identity theft is one of the fastest growing crimes in the United States. Identity theft occurs when someone uses your personal information (name, social security number, credit card number, etc) without your permission, to commit a crime or obtain credit.

How does someone get your information? They use many different methods, including going through your garbage or mail, calling you, sending you an e-mail, or stealing your wallet or purse. It is important for you to know that we will never call you and attempt to obtain your personal information.

Here are a few reminders to help you protect yourself from being a victim of identity theft:

- Never respond to unsolicited correspondence (whether via mail, phone, e-mail, or text message) asking for personal information such as your social security number or bank account information.
- Never click on a link or open an attachment within an unsolicited e-mail.
- If you want to verify the legitimacy of a piece of correspondence, call the company's phone number by looking it up on your credit/debit card, or statement. <u>DO NOT</u> call the number listed or enter the web address given in the message.

Madison Adult Career Center

MACC students are having success through the Adult Diploma Program! Ohio residents, at least 22 years of age, can enroll, free of charge, upon meeting WorkKeys entrance requirements. WorkKeys tutoring is also available. Students can earn an Ohio Adult High School Diploma, while gaining technical skills and certification(s). Since the program's fall of 2017 inception, 71 MACC students have gained their Ohio Adult High School Diplomas through technical programs such as: State Tested Nurse Aide, Welding Technology, Automotive Lube Technician, Precision Machining/CNC Technology, and Basic Office Support Services (B.O.S.S).

Heather Mosier graduated from the Welding Technology Adult Diploma program earning her adult high school diploma and a welding certification. She continued her education, with advanced standing, in MACC's 630-hour Welding Technology program, earning three additional welding certifications, and gaining full-time employment as a certified welder.

Heather's story....



"I found out about MACC's Adult Diploma Program through a friend and employee at Madison. I have overcome several challenges including drug addiction, low employability, and felony conviction. Earning my high school diploma has impacted my life because now I have a good paying job that allows me to provide for my daughter, own my first car, and I recently moved into a house I'm renting. I pursued welding because at the time it's what

was available that interested me. I love working with my hands. Advice I would give, especially to females, would be stick to it. Some people will say things to discourage you and say we females do not

belong in the field. Stay strong. I have a great support system among my church, family, and God. A lot of people encouraged me through my ups and downs. I have people and family that believed in me when I didn't believe in myself. I've accomplished being 3yrs sober of drugs and having the support I need. This program has made a huge impact in my life."

Thanks to our team of drivers, students and parents of Madison schools for a successful school year even with its challenges! Each day we transport approximately 1,100 students to and from school.

Students are encouraged to observe the school bus safety rules posted on every bus. They are essentially the same things you would observe in a classroom. We ask parents' help in encouraging their students to

follow the bus rules. One way to do this for the little ones is to ask them each day one rule they should observe on the bus and then explain to them why it is important. I cannot stress enough how important and crucial your help as a parent can be.

Did you know our district encompasses 49 square miles, and every year we travel approximately 235,000 miles to take students to each of our schools as well as the other schools we service? We transport students on field trips driving about 28,000 miles annually.



One of the biggest changes in the Treasurer's department over the past few months has been in our staff. We said goodbye to Sandi Davis who was the Assistant Treasurer and served the Madison District for over 30 years!

We continue our ongoing efforts to streamline, and improve our district's finances. We were able to sell an obsolete building which was the Jesse Beer Early Childhood Learning Center at public auction. Additionally, we've been very busy researching and applying for multiple Federal grants for aid during the COVID-19 Pandemic.
