Greetings from the Superintendent

Madison Ram Community,

As the school year winds down, I hope that this newsletter finds you and your family well. It is our intent through the newsletters to keep you informed of the exciting things that have transpired throughout the district along with other pertinent dates and upcoming events.

As you are reading this newsletter, I am hopeful that our 5-year, 6.9 mill renewal levy was supported by our voters on May 3rd. The passage of the levy was critical to the district's financial stability so that we can continue to meet the educational and extracurricular opportunity needs of our students; so that we can continue to recruit and retain our outstanding teachers, staff, and administration; so that we can update and upgrade our technology, curriculum, and educational resources; and so that we can maintain our buildings, grounds, and facilities. The renewal levy will not generate



new funds for the district or be an additional cost for taxpayers, but if passed will continue to generate between \$1.5 and \$2 million of operating funds for the district. The district has not placed a new operating levy on the ballot since 1997, and over the past 25 years the district has attempted to be good stewards of our operating funds and be as resourceful as possible in the operation of the district.

I am also happy to report that the district has negotiated an agreement with our classified employee association (OAPSE) on a 3-year contract through July, 2024. Our classified staff members (bus drivers, mechanics, custodians/maintenance, secretaries, aides, cooks, technology staff, and library technicians) do an excellent job and work very hard to support our students and their education.

The Madison Local School District Strategic Plan is in the implementation phase and is providing the framework and direction for our decision-making and will continue to do so over the next 3-5 years. Throughout the school year we have developed and implemented action plans for each of the five focus areas of our plan: 1)Student Learning and Support, 2)Financial Responsibility, 3)Culture and Climate, 4) Communication and Engagement, and 5)Facility Improvement and Development.

In closing, I would like to thank the Madison Staff, Madison Families, and the Madison Community for a wonderful school year, for all of your ongoing support, and for all that you do for the students of the Madison Local School District!

It is hard to believe that we are nearing the end of this school year. I hope our students had a restful spring break and are motivated to give their maximum effort as this year draws to a close. Here is a quick update on what has been happening at the high school. Senior Addyson Cox and Business Management Technologies Teacher Holly North were both recognized at the annual Franklin B. Walter Scholarship Dinner on March 8th at the Mid-Ohio Educational Service Center. Addyson was selected as Madison's representative, and she honored Mrs. North as the person who inspired her.

On March 15th, all Madison juniors were provided an opportunity to take the ACT exam. On that day, the junior students reported to school at the normal time and were divided up into classrooms for test administration. In an effort to provide the best environment possible for our students to test, all other students (freshmen, sophomores, and seniors) participated in remote instruction. The day went extremely well, and I would like to thank our students for putting forth their best effort!

That effort was also evident as the sophomore students took the English End of Course Exam prior to Spring Break. It was obvious that our teachers did a great job preparing our students for the exam. Students exhibited test-taking strategies, used their time wisely, and displayed positive attitudes throughout both days of testing. Again, I want our students to know how much we appreciate their efforts!

I hope all of you had the opportunity to see our Spring Musical and High School Talent Show recently. On March 18th, 19th and 20th, Mr. Green and Mr. Weston guided the students through their rendition of 42nd Street. Our students put in countless hours of preparation, and it undoubtedly paid off. All three performances were full of great individual and group musical selections. The very next week, Key Club held our annual talent show, "Madison's Got Talent." Thomas Hoagland took home first place, but all performances were noteworthy. Our Key Club would like to thank Kiwanis for their willingness to act as judges and for their continued support.

On April 1st, we held our All–School PBIS Reward Celebration. District Maintenance News



While we prepare for our annual summer deep cleaning, and project schedule, we have two very large tasks we are attempting to complete over the ten week summer break. One is a large roof restoration project at Madison South, where we will be completing the project we began last year, and working on about 60% of the roof of this building. The second project is the Air quality improvement initiative we have been working on for the last several months. This will allow us to provide air conditioning, as well as improved air filtration, at all of our elementary classrooms as well as the high school cafeteria, and 8 classrooms at the HS that do not have windows. This large project is being paid for with ES-SER funds from the Federal government. Beyond these items our Maintenance and Custodial staff are constantly working hard to try to keep our older buildings in the best condition possible. If we take out the Middle School which is now 8 years old, the average age of our buildings is just a little over 60 years old. Once commercial buildings reach this age, we are seeing a lot of issues with things such as the plumbing systems where the piping used is past its typical lifespan, and the scope of our repairs become larger and larger. With this said, we strive daily to do as much as we can with the resources we have, to maintain these aging structures and provide the safest, cleanest buildings possible for our students and staff.



Food Service News

Looking forward to next year, the State and USDA will NOT be providing free meals to all students. Families that qualify will need to fill out the Free & Reduced application in Final Forms. The district is currently waiting for the State to set requirements for the fees of meals for the 22-23 school year. We will be sure to post that information once we have it available. Parents can begin checking their student's food service account and adding funds for next school year.

The Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer (P-EBT) card will be offered again this summer. Qualifications for this program are based on information the district receives from the State Direct Certification report, which is generated from applications submitted in Final Forms and completed in the PaySchools online portal. You will need to make sure to have your address updated so that funds will go to the correct address. If you need a replacement card, you will need to contact the P-EBT helpline at 1-866-244-0071.

The weather has made it tough this spring, but our athletes and coaches are doing their best to stay positive and get through it. Our boys and girls track teams are off to a great start both finishing in the top 5 at the Mehock relays. Alexia Davis medaled in four events! The senior was first in the 100m and 200m and third in the 400 m. Senior Isaac Brooks was the champion in the 300m hurdles. The boys 4x100 relay team of Issac Brooks, Noah Finley, Phil Stupka, and Joe Stupka also took home the gold. Callie Cyrus had a strong showing in the distance with a third place finish in the 1600m.
