Madison Ram Community,

As we enter the fall season and approach the Thanksgiving holiday, I hope that this newsletter finds you and your family well. It is our intent through the newsletters to keep you informed of the exciting things that have transpired throughout the district along with other pertinent dates and upcoming events.



I would like to begin with a huge **THANK YOU** to all of you in the Ram Community who have worked together to initiate a great start to the 2021-22 school year. While we thought this school year would allow us to return to "normal," we have continued to battle COVID, other illness, and staffing and substitute issues since the beginning of the school year, causing three of our buildings to move to Remote Learning, each for a period of about one week.

Students and parents, your understanding, flexibility, and support has been very helpful. Students have continued to adapt well to the changes that are taking place on a regular basis. We know that there have been and will continue to be sacrifices made along the way, but our decisions continue to be made in the interest of maintaining face-to-face instruction in our classrooms as well as keeping the health and safety of our students, staff, and community in mind.

I also cannot say enough about the efforts and flexibility of our teachers, staff, coaches, advisors, and administration during the first two months of the school year. They continue to focus on providing quality instruction as safely as possible. This summer a group of students, parents, community members, teachers, staff, administrators, and board members gathered together at the Mid-Ohio Educational Service Center to develop a new Strategic Plan for the district. The plan will provide structure for the district and help guide our decision-making over the next 3-5 years.

As we look forward to 2022, district finances will need to be addressed so that we can continue to meet the educational and extracurricular opportunity needs of our students, so that we can continue to recruit and retain our outstanding teachers, staff, and administration, and so that we can keep our curriculum, educational resources, and buildings and grounds updated. The district will have a renewal levy on the ballot in 2022, however as the cost of doing business as a school district has increased over time, it has been nearly 25 years since the district last approved new operating funds in 1997. Over the past 25 years the district has attempted to be good stewards of our operating funds and stretch them for as long as possible through reducing expenditures where possible, including reducing staff to the point where we are staffed at a minimal level. As a result of the revenue shortfall, the district is in need of an additional operating levy being placed on the ballot in the near future. The district has worked diligently to avoid going to the ballot and asking for new operating funds for 25 years, however we look forward to your support in the future as we continue to meet the needs of our students, their families, and the Madison Local School District Community.

Thank you again, Madison Staff, Madison Families, and Madison Community, for all of your support and for all that you do for the students of the Madison Local School District. Go Rams!

Last year Renee and Phil met with our student leadership team to focus on leadership skills and diversity training. It was a tremendous success, and we are very excited to have them back for another year. They will continue to meet with our student leaders and work with them on ways to use their leadership skills to promote diversity and tolerance and positively impact the Madison School Community.



Homecoming was a huge success this year! After not being able to hold the event last year, our students were extremely excited to participate in "Spirit Week", the homecoming assembly, and ultimately the Homecoming Dance. To allow for more space and increased air flow, we moved the dance to the middle school gymnasium. We had a large turnout, and a great time was had by all. 
I am proud of all of our students and staff members! We truly have an awesome group here at MCHS!

PBIS involves teaching students expected behaviors in a consistent and positive way, modeling and acknowledging those behaviors, and helping all students meet expectations and be successful. PBIS has been shown to improve student achievement, student behavior and school climate, and we are so proud of our students and staff for working hard to earn this recognition. We will be honored at the 2021 Ohio PBIS Showcase in conjunction with the Ohio Leadership Advisory Council (OLAC) virtual conference on Dec. 9, 2021. Mifflin is also busy preparing for two events this month including the return of Donuts with Dad and an in-school field trip to the Skydome. Donuts with Dad is one of the highlight events driven by the Mifflin PTO where the school recognizes the positive impact that our fathers, grandfathers, uncles, brothers, or friends can have on the lives of our students. The Skydome is sponsored by the Mifflin PTO and will allow students an opportunity to visit an inflatable planetarium to teach them about stars, planets, and all things outer space! ## Food Service News

Madison Local School District Food Service Department is continuing to provide FREE meals to ALL students through the end of the school year through funding from ODE and USDA. Please be aware that an extra milk or other extra items that your child selects must be paid for and cannot be provided free of charge. Please make sure funds are available on your child's account for these extras. To place funds onto your child's account, go to the Food Service tab on the school website, and click on the PaySchools box. It will prompt you to set up and/or log into your PaySchools account. You can set up options for your child to have automatic funds placed on their account, track their spending, and set up notices when their funds are low.

Due to nationwide food shortages, we are having difficulty getting certain menu items. We continue to attempt to purchase the items that the students enjoy, however we aren't always able to do so. One of the items that we are having difficulty receiving is peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. As a result there may be times when the Food Service Department cannot provide this as an alternate meal. Parents will have to plan accordingly if their child won't eat anything else. We will continue to request these items from our vendors, but there is no way to know when exactly they will be available. We apologize for any inconvenience that this may cause.

The Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer (P-EBT) will be offered again this year to qualifying students. Qualifications are based on correctly completed applications submitted in Final Forms and/or the PaySchools online portal. Funds will be provided when students are absent due to COVID quarantine/illness, COVID related school closures or remote learning days. ## Madison Early Childhood Learning Center



MECLC started implementing Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) in our Preschool program. Students earn leadership tickets for a weekly prize drawing. They

also receive verbal praises, class awards, and other material rewards when they follow the school matrix. The school matrix encompasses three rules – Be Kind, Be Safe, and Be Responsible. The school age program will begin to implement PBIS in the spring, and are looking forward to earning class parties as a part of a team reward, and helping the younger children at MECLC as school role models.

MECLC is excited to announce we have a new logo to represent our program! The logo represents the growth and development of children learning a variety of topics in our early childhood program. We will begin to add this logo to all of our program informational tools including our webpage, Facebook page, letterhead, and marketing materials.

Creating community partnerships is very important to MECLC so that we can continue to provide important resources to our families and children in our community. We are currently partnering with Catalyst to provide Triple P parenting classes to parents and children ages 2-10 years old. These are offered in the evenings during the months of September-November. We hope to provide more of these classes to families and children in the community during the spring next year.

MECLC also partners with Madison Adult Education to provide a community advocate, Robyn McNulty, to visit the Madison South Latchkey after school program site twice a month during the hours of 4:00 pm – 6:00 pm. Robyn meets with Madison South families to discuss any needs they may have (food, cloth-

ing, utilities, childcare, etc.), and she helps them find the resources to meet their needs. We hope to have Robyn visit our Eastview Latchkey after school program site as well in the near future.

Our preschool students had an exciting visit from the Madison Fire Department for Fire Prevention Week in October to discuss fire safety. The firefighters brought their fire truck and rescue squads to show the students. They also wore their firefighting gear for a demonstration. Our students were very eager to learn about fire safety! Thank you to the Madison Fire Department for visiting MECLC! We appreciate all that you do for our community!

We will begin enrollment for our summer school age program on May 1<sup>st</sup> for Kindergarten – 6<sup>th</sup> grade students. This is a full time only summer program, \$110/week, and all meals are included. School age teachers are degreed and licensed in education. Students will attend field trips and participate in the summer library reading program. Community Action for Capable Youth (CACY) provides a summer program for our school age students on bully prevention, self-esteem, and building confidence. 


to Kindergarten and Preschool teachers. This has been a great opportunity for the senior students to get hands-on experience working with our kiddos

## District Maintenance



The district custodians have been working diligently to keep our buildings cleaned, and do extra disinfecting. This has been challenging as we've recently had a rash of staff illnesses to deal with, but everyone has pitched in to do all we can to get the work done. We have been working on three major roofing projects, and at this point all have been completed. This includes the partial roof replacement at the High School, as well as partial restoration of the roofs at Madison South and Mifflin. While the High School food lab renovation is completed, we are still working on the cosmetology theory room and dispensary. The project is about 50% done and moving along well. We have also begun the permit process to add a much needed handicap restroom off of our High School gym lobby replacing a coaches' office. In addition to these items and many smaller projects, we are also moving forward with establishing a scope of work, and setting a budget for a very large project to improve air quality, and to provide air conditioning to all of our elementary school classrooms using our federal ES-SER funds. Additionally the district maintenance department is working hard to keep up with mowing and all of the grounds maintenance at the seven sites we currently maintain. Lastly, even as we prepare for the snow season, we are also looking for mowers for next spring, and substitute custodians for this school year.
