Greetings from the Superintendent...Rob Peterson

Madison Ram Community,

As we kick off the 2022-23 school year, I hope that this newsletter finds you and your family well. It is our intent through the "Ram Nation News" to keep you informed of the exciting things that are going on across the district along with other pertinent dates and upcoming events.



I am extremely happy to report that we have gotten off to a very smooth start to the school year as we finish up the first nine-week grading period on Friday, October 14th. I would like to thank all of our teachers, staff, and administration as well as our students and their families for all of their efforts and the great start to the school year!

Just over a year ago a group of students, parents, community members, teachers, staff, administrators, and board members gathered together at the Mid-Ohio Educational Service Center to develop a new Strategic Plan for the district. The Strategic Plan was fully implemented during the 2021-22

school year and will help provide a framework and direction for the district over the next 3-5 years. The framework for the plan includes the following:

District Mission Statement—"Madison Local School District partners with families, staff and community – creating a culture of learning for everyone and empowering students to reach their full potential."

District Vision Statement—"Building our community...Creating endless opportunties...Ram Pride!"

Areas of Focus—Student Learning and Support, Culture and Climate, Financial Responsibility, Communication and Engagement, and Facility Improvement and Development.

As we look forward to 2023, district finances will need to be addressed so that we can continue to meet the educational and extracurricular opportunity needs of our students, so that we can continue to recruit and retain high-quality teachers, staff, and administration, and so that we can keep our curriculum and educational resources as well as our buildings and grounds updated. The cost of doing business as a school district has increased over time, however it has been 25 years since the district last approved new operating funds in 1997. Additionally, the most recent District Financial Forecast shows




that the district general fund will go into a negative balance during the 2024-25 school year unless new operating funds are secured or significant reductions in expenditures are made. Consequently, the district will be placing a levy for additional operating funds on the May, 2023 primary ballot.

Thank you again, Madison Staff, Madison Families, and Madison Community, for all of your support and for all that you do for the students of the Madison Local School District. Go Rams!

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MCT MADISON CAREER-TECH

Career Tech recently kicked off Skills USA for this year while partnering with the Ohio National Guard. All 11 programs participated within the kick-off which included team building challenges throughout most of the day on September 15th. Some of the challenges included pull-ups, balance beam challenges, and a jug carry competition. These activities promoted problem solving and being an active member of a team.



The Culinary Arts program is in the preparation phase of the new addition of a coffee bar which will be constructed within the Ramble Inn. I am excited to report some excellent progress on our Ohio State Tests, which are reflected on the recent State Report Card. The major area of focus has been raising our Performance Index. The Performance Index measures the test results of every student, not just those who score proficient or higher. Schools and districts receive points on the index for every student who takes a test. The higher the performance level on the state tests, the more points awarded toward the index score.



Last school year, our building set a goal of raising our Performance Index by five points. I am happy to report that we not only met that goal, but far surpassed it. We raised our previous score by 12 points. This is attributed to the hard work and dedication of our teaching staff and students.

In five of the six End of Course exams, our school scored above the state average and made significant gains from the previous year's tests. Although we are extremely proud of the accomplishments of our teachers and students, we are not satisfied with the results. This year we plan to examine the results and make the needed adjustments to continue to put our students in the best situation to be successful. I hope to see continued growth and improvement.

Students are encouraged to observe the school bus safety rules posted on every bus. They are essentially the same things you would observe in a classroom. We ask parents to encourage their students to follow the bus rules. One way to do this is to ask them each day one rule they should observe on the bus and then explain to them why it is important. I cannot stress enough how important and crucial your assistance as a parent can be.

Did you know our district encompasses 49 square miles, and every year we travel approximately 235,000 miles to take students to each of our schools as well as the non-public schools we service? We transport students on field trips, driving about 28,000 miles annually.

Madison Early Childhood Learning Center

meet their new friends on their first day of preschool. We have five preschool classrooms this year, adding a fifth classroom to meet the program needs of our community. All of our preschool classrooms have a full day preschool schedule. Our preschool hours are Monday through Friday, 8:30 AM to 11:00

AM. We also provide wrap around child-care for before and after preschool from 6:30 AM to 6:00 PM.





Our students love visiting the Gorman Nature Center every spring, and they were so happy when the Gorman Nature Center came to visit us at the beginning of September with their black rat snake. All of our students loved being able to hold the snake and learn facts about the snake. The Gorman Nature Center will be visiting us in our preschool program four times this year to help our students learn more about different animals and their habitats.

The Infant program has increased the enrollment in the 6 weeks to 12 months old classroom to meet the

needs of our families. We doubled our infant ratio in our Infant 1 room to open five additional spots for more infants. We now have 16 full time infants in our Infant program, and we love getting all of those cuddles and seeing their smiles everyday!

The Infant teachers help our infants meet their developmental milestones using the Creative Curriculum. This curriculum is a framework that provides developmental goals in the areas of cognitive, language, physical, and social-emotional development. Infants are assessed using this curriculum four times each year. Our infants are also screened within their first two months in our infant program using the ASQ-3 screening

tool. This tool helps our teachers know the developmental levels and progress of each infant in their classroom.



Madison South Preschool

We're back at it! Madison South Preschool is off and underway for yet another great school year! We were fortunate to be able to add to our preschool staff this year with an educational aide in Mrs. Camillo's room, Miss Kilie Justice. Each of the three classrooms now has the intervention specialist, who also serves as the preschool teacher, and two educational aides to help support our students. We also had an educational aide retire this past year and filled that spot with another new educational aide, Mrs. Laura White. Miss Justice and Mrs. White have both been great additions to our preschool team!

Our preschoolers have been learning a lot of things already this year on topics such as Back to School, Safety, How To Be A Friend, Chicka Chicka Boom Boom and Feelings/Emotions. We also started our Virtual Fun Friday lessons where preschoolers have the option of viewing videos created by the Preschool Coordinator or Preschool Teachers that are sent to parents on various Fridays throughout the school year. These are 30 minute lessons that contain a variety of different activities such as music/movement, cutting practice, working on letters, art projects, teachers reading stories and more. These are optional, but another fun way to connect with preschoolers and their families on days we don't have school.

Madison South Preschool continued...We are looking forward to a few things coming up. We started our year with a visit from Mrs. Brindi from the Madison Branch Library (one of our Community Partners) who will be coming once per month throughout the school year. Also, Mr. Peterson, Madison Local Schools Superintendent, will be coming to read to our preschoolers again this year each month. We are fortunate to have great administrators in our district who are willing to be involved in our programming. Our friends and community partners from the Ohio Bird Sanctuary will start visiting us in October once per month as well. This is always a favorite of our preschoolers because the kids always get to see and learn about an animal.

Our first family activity day took place at the end of September where the preschool staff provided several activities in an effort to promote family engagement. This was a fun time had by all!

While we still have a few spots left, our preschool classes are filling up fast! We enroll typical peer models as well as students with special needs. This year we extended our class sessions by 10 minutes to be two hours, forty minutes long. As a school, we currently have more than three times as many leadership referrals as behavior referrals, which is amazing! We would love to continue that trend and reward and celebrate those students making great decisions in all parts of the building throughout the year through leadership referrals, Ram Rallys, and much more! Please encourage your student to continue to follow expectations everywhere throughout the building so they can see how rewarding that can be. Thank you for all of your efforts at home as we work as a team to help the students grow!

PBIS

We have been working extremely hard here at South developing and implementing a strong PBIS program. South was recently awarded bronze level from the state for our development and implementation of PBIS, which was awarded to only 375 different schools. PBIS, stands for positive behavioral interventions and supports and is an approach schools use to promote good behaviors, choices, teaching students expectations, and rewarding students that meet and exceed expectations. Students not meeting expectations go through different interventions to help teach and re-teach expected and acceptable behaviors. We have established different ways



to reward and celebrate our students who meet and exceed expectations through Ram Rallys (end of the month event for students not receiving a major, everyone starts fresh at the start of each month), All Year Ram Rally (event for students who did not receive a major all year), Leadership Referrals (staff submit names of students who are caught being Ready Accountable Mindful or Successful), Fancy Friday (students selected by their teacher that best exemplified that week's theme to eat on the stage and receive a special treat), and DOJO points (points students earn for positive behaviors that can be used to purchase different items in the Ram Shack). Here you'll see Leadership Referral raffle winners and our Ram Rally preview day!

This link is available to assist parents/guardians in getting their child's free or reduced status updated immediately once the application is signed electronically. Parents/ Guardians must register on the PaySchoolsCentral.com first. The PaySchoolsCentral link, step-by-step instructions for registration, and the online Free & Reduced application, are on the Food Service tab on the district website.

Parent/Guardians are welcome to set up notifications on their child's lunch fund on PaySchoolsCentral. The PaySchoolsCentral App is also available to be downloaded once you have completed the registration process. You also have the availability to have automatic funds added to your child's account, track their meals, and set up notices to be sent to you when your child's funds are low. Parents/ Guardians can also add funds to their child's meal account by sending funds in with your child via cash or check.
