# SPOTLIGHT ON FIFTH GRADE

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Wow! It's hard to believe we are down to the final days of school. We are so proud of our students! They have persevered through the most challenging times during their fifth grade year. This will be a year no one will ever forget!

This year in science, we explored the physics of motion and applied these concepts to technological design. Using K'Nex pieces, students designed and built vehicles to meet certain requirements. Students recorded their designs using technical two and three-view drawings. Cost analysis, friction, kinetic and potential energy were just some of the concepts applied. Currently, the students are examining everyday objects with a variety of magnifying devices. They began looking at objects with the unaided eye, progressed to hand lenses, and now finally making detailed observations using a microscope. Students learned proper focusing and lighting techniques, as well as how to prepare slides.



In social studies, the students enjoyed learning about the Native Americans, early explorers, and the 13 colonies. Students did a fabulous job researching and learning about notable figures of the Revolutionary War. Students demonstrated their knowledge by creating Bio Posters on figures such as Thomas Jefferson, Phillis Wheatley, Benjamin Franklin, Abigail Adams, and Alexander Hamilton. The students are ending the year by learning about the Constitution of the United States.

Over the past school year, students have learned or improved 16 new math topics. They have learned to add, subtract, multiply, and divide whole numbers, decimals, and fractions. Students applied these skills to calculate volume, coordinates, and convert measurements. We will wrap the year up with using graphs to summarize data.

In ELA, the students are enjoying the novel: Out of My Mind, by Sharon Draper. Some important themes are present as we read: acceptance, rejection, family, disability, and ability are just to name a few. Our main character, Melody, is the smartest kid in her school, but no one knows it, including her teachers and doctors. Being stuck inside her head is making Melody go out of her mind, until she discovers something that will allow her to speak for the first time ever. At last Melody has a voice, but not everyone is ready to hear it.

Sara says the novel is amazing! Terry says we all love the novel!

Leah says just because someone has a disability, you treat them the same.

We wish our students the best as they transition to Middle School. It has been a real pleasure teaching them this year. As challenging as this year has been, the students persevered. We are proud of their efforts and know they will be successful in the future.
