# A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER: L-B Driving Ahead with New Bus Garage



On March 15, the Liberty-Benton Local School District initiated plans for a new 18,000-square-foot bus storage and maintenance facility. The district reviewed four proposals, and after careful evaluation, the Board approved a \$1,396,120 contract with Charles Construction. The new garage will be

located just south of the new Elementary and Middle School buildings and is set for completion by Dec. 31, 2024.

The one-story building will include a wash bay, maintenance bay, restrooms, a break room, two offices, and 13 bays for bus and equipment storage. Not only will it keep all the buses protected and secure, but it will also enhance the district's ability to keep them clean, operational, and ready to safely transport students. The strategic location near campus will streamline operations and improve overall transportation services.

Starting in January, we launched Leadership Interest Clubs, giving our Eagle Leaders the chance to dive into new interests and build their leadership skills. The Hancock County Business Advisory Council organized an event where students could speak with professionals from various fields. This collaboration between local industry and education aims to prepare students for post-graduation careers. The event, developed by career educators from Liberty-Benton, Cory-Rawson, and Van Buren, along with Raise the Bar workforce program specialists, involved over 100 community volunteers and 250 students.

In preparation, students created resumes, learned about professional attire, and practiced interview questions. They had taken the YouScience assessment, which helped identify best-fit career choices. At the event, students chose interview stations based on career clusters and received feedback from professionals. In addition to two interviews, they attended sessions led by Tiffin University's Career Services Center on resume and interview skills, and by Raise the Bar, United Way, and Exploring on increasing leadership skills and enhancing resumes, college, and scholarship applications.

We are proud to announce that one of our own Liberty-Benton Future Farmers of America (FFA) Chapter members was honored this year at the 96th State FFA Convention, held on May 3 at The Ohio Expo Center in Columbus. Lilly Conrad achieved the prestigious State FFA Degree, the highest honor that the Ohio State FFA Association can award. This significant accomplishment places Lilly among the most outstanding FFA members statewide, with only 1,050 members receiving this honor this year.

#### Lilly's journey to the State FFA Degree involved:

- Rigorous dedication and a deep commitment to her Supervised Agriculture Experience (SAE) in poultry production, meticulously documenting her agricultural activities (including time management and financial records) through the Agricultural Experience Tracker (AET)
- · Contributing over 25 hours of community service
- Engaging in multiple FFA events
- Mastering classroom standards



#### **L-B Second-Graders Receive STEM Grant**

Findlay Rotary Club awarded a STEM grant to Mrs. Myers' 2nd grade class. This grant provides hands-on, scientific experiment manipulatives. Students are now able to design, build, and then conduct experiments using these materials. The week was packed with engaging theme days, reading sessions with kindergartners and first graders, and educational collaborations with fourth graders on agriculture in STEM. Finally, the FFA chapter teamed up with the Agriculture Advocacy and Helping Hands Action Team to spearhead a Meals of Hope Community Service project during the high school's Field Day. For the project, these students packaged a remarkable 10,000 meals, demonstrating their commitment not just to agriculture, but also toward making a tangible difference in our community.



## Mixing Art and Science: 7th-Graders Use Eclipse as Inspiration for Project

Liberty-Benton students in all grades were excited to view this year's solar eclipse, and many teachers created classroom activities to enhance the students' understanding of this incredible and rare event. From kindergarten students eating eclipse-themed snacks to NEST students participating in coloring page contests, the students were inspired to be creative.

Mrs. Arnold's 7th grade artists created mixed media outer space scenes including a full eclipse with "Bailey Beads and Diamond Rings." Students used watercolors, tempera, oil pastel, and charcoal to create stunning solar eclipse art.

### Committee Determines "Portrait of an Eagle"

#### LBHS "Moon Tree" is Out of This World



Liberty-Benton High School is now home to a piece of space history! On April 25, 2024, a unique "Moon Tree" was planted in front of the high school. This special tree, a Sycamore, stands at  $54 \frac{1}{2}$  inches and is expected to grow two feet each year, thriving for generations to come.

The story behind our Moon Tree is fascinating. On November 16, 2022, NASA sent seeds from five different tree species into space as part of the Artemis Missions. These seeds orbited the moon for nine days before returning to Earth. After careful study and germination by NASA and the USDA Forest Service, these seeds were distributed to schools and organizations across the country. L-B science teacher Dillon Webster applied for one of the special trees. Due to his efforts, the school now has a living part of space exploration history.
