


For the 8th consecutive year, the district received the **Auditor of State Award**





ARTS

1,150 district students

displayed work at the 2018 Liberty-Benton Arts Festival, an annual district-wide event in the spring.

45

District performing arts groups, including high school and middle school bands and choirs and the high school acapella group "Fermata the Blue", collectively **performed**45 times during the 2017-18 school year, including one TV recording session.

1,000 district students

and their families visited, volunteered or performed at the 2018 Liberty-Benton Arts Festival.

Both high school choirs advanced to the state competition for the 1st time in district history, and both received a **Superior** rating.



Elementary Service Learning Project: Kindergarten collected three large boxes of personal care items for **Chopin Hall**; 1st grade performed songs at **Sunrise Nursing Home** and created cards and placements for the residents; in a partnership with the **American Red Cross**, all 2nd grade students wrote inspirational messages in 150 holiday cards that were mailed to **active military service members** around the world; the 3rd grade class partnered with **Hancock Jobs & Family Services** and **Scholastic Books** to donate over 100 new pajamas and books to local families; and 4th & 5th grade made "Mission Possible" by collecting **school supplies for schools in Haiti**.

Middle School Students Make a Difference: Hosted a Red Cross blood drive that saved 93 lives; 3,815 items were collected through the school's Salvation Army food drive; students collected and donated 150 coats for the Coats for Christmas drive; the school raised \$1,500 for Hoops for Health and \$682 for the Diabetes Walk; students filled 100 shoeboxes for FCA Club; students collected and donated school supplies to Mission Possible; profits from a candy cane sale were used to purchase gifts for children from the Angel Tree; and dozens of middle school students donated their time to provide service to the community.

The High School is Making STRIDES Through
Leadership and Service: 100% of LBHS students
participated in STRIDES, which stands for Students
Taking Roles in Developing Educational Success, and
participated in a service-learning project, such as
volunteering at a shelter, caroling at a nursing
home or stocking a food pantry. Throughout the
year, the groups also competed in activities for a cause
such as penny wars, box top collections and canned
food drives.



TECHNOLOGY

Only district in the county that has a Wi-Fi access point in every single room.

100%

of district students have direct access to a computer device through the district's 1:1 technology initiative.

Every district classroom is equipped with an **interactive whiteboard** and every middle school and elementary school classroom is equipped with **Apple TV** for **interactive** and **real-time sharing**.

Tech Talk Tuesdays

are held every Tuesday before school to introduce teachers to new technology to incorporate into their classroom experiences.

Implementation of Commonsense.org cyber safety curriculum at the elementary and middle school levels, incorporating cyber bullying prevention techniques as well as advice about being responsible, safe digital citizens.

ALL 7th grade

students presented Popcorn and Preview final projects, utilizing technology to executive projects such as creating websites to help gather donations for a local pet rescue or creating infographics on how to get a good night of sleep.
