


Along with the other students at my school, I am very fortunate to have attended Liberty-Benton high school during such unprecedented times.

During the shutdown in March, Liberty-Benton did a fantastic job at quickly adapting to the situation at hand. The school district was able to make a seamless transition to online learning, whereas many other schools were sadly unable to finish out the rest of the school year due to a lack of resources. Making the transition to online learning was extremely difficult for many students, and the teachers went above and beyond to be very supportive, helpful, and understanding during this transition. The staff at Liberty-Benton worked hard over the summer to create a plan that would allow the students to return to school five days a week while maintaining safety procedures.

DEPUTY BRANDON KENDRICK

On Jan. 9, we celebrated Deputy Brandon Kendrick, Liberty-Benton's School Resource Officer (SRO), as part of National Law Enforcement Day. He has been a member of the Hancock County Sheriff Department since 2014, and joined the Eagle family as the SRO in August 2020. He's been an integral part of the team ever since.

Kendrick spends time in all three of our buildings each day interacting with students and staff. From volunteering at Stevi B's PTO night to handing out free pizza coupons to student drivers he sees wearing their seat belt to help promote Click It or Ticket, his love for kids is apparent.



He was instrumental to Liberty-Benton having a smooth start to this school year by helping direct the increased amount of commuter traffic due to the hybrid learning schedule. Each week, he also patrols our bus routes. Kendrick is well known for producing safety videos that are featured on our district website as well, these have included school bus safety and trick-or-treating safety. Kendrick aims to keep students safe both in and outside of school, as evidenced by his latest educational initiative. He worked with Liberty-Benton's school nurse, middle and high school health teachers and the director of operations to develop a curriculum on vaping. He is currently visiting classrooms with a presentation on the dangers associated with vaping, and with his assistance, the district installed vape detectors in the high school bathrooms and locker rooms last August.

This year, he's also working with Deputies Brunswick and Miller, the K-9 handlers from the sheriff's department, and their dogs Charlie and Sonny, to teach elementary-aged students more about their role in protecting our community.

We are grateful to Deputy Kendrick every day for his commitment to building relationships in our community and protecting our Liberty-Benton School District.



TREASURER'S REPORT



COVID-19 continues to impact every facet of our lives, including our school finances. But we do have some good news to report. On Jan. 22, Governor DeWine signed an executive order formalizing the budget reductions for FY2021. As part of this order, he released \$152 million back to Ohio's school districts.

While not a return to pre-pandemic funding levels, this does mean that Liberty-Benton School District will receive more than originally forecasted. Just as we've done throughout the pandemic, we will continue prioritizing our funding allotment to meet the learning and safety needs of our students so they can be successful now and in the future.

In other news, we have some Cares Act monies remaining to help get us to the finish line of this school year. A portion of this funding was allocated to midday bus routes while we were in hybrid learning. Our leadership team is thoughtfully considering the best use of the remaining funds based on spending requirements. Initial discussions have centered around addressing learning loss, and upgrading and improving air quality in our buildings.

We will remain steadfast in our efforts to be good stewards of your taxpayer dollars. Stay tuned for further updates as we continue navigating the uncharted waters of this global pandemic.

Kindergarten teacher Heagan Sparling goes above and beyond to include all of her students everyday

These are challenging times for all of us, particularly those who were already entering a transitional year like kindergarteners! Their first experiences in school will be remembered by mask-wearing and learning from home on some days. That's why Mrs. Sparling is doing all she can to normalize the year and build confidence in her young learners.

One area where she knew she could make an impact is with students in quarantine. Maybe not surprisingly, 5 and 6-year-olds are curious, so when a student is absent, they are very concerned about the wellbeing of their friend and classmate. She said, "As I thought about the curiosity of the students in my classroom, I began thinking the reverse is probably true as well. The student at home is likely wondering what their classmates are doing, does my teacher know I'm not sick but in quarantine and do my friends and teacher miss me?"

So she decided to take the classroom to the student in quarantine and the student in quarantine to the classroom. After all, we've gotten extremely adept at staying connected virtually over the last year. As soon as she learns that a student will be out for more than a day, she gathers all the supplies they will need to learn from home, including instructions on when they should join the class via Google Meet. She delivers the supplies to the student's front porch, along with a prepackaged treat to let them know she's thinking about them.

Back at school, she sets the computer on a seat so when the day begins, the student is back in class... well, virtually at least! She said one of the highlights of meeting remotely with students who are unable to physically be in the classroom is their morning song.

"Each morning, we sing a song and greet each other by name. I can always hear our quarantined friend through the speaker singing loud and proud," she said. "The smile on the face of the student at home when we greet him/her by name will warm anyone's heart."

Her ultimate goal is to provide a well-rounded education to each of her students, one that's focused on academic as well as social-emotional learning. Thank you, Mrs. Sparling, for being the ultimate example of what it means to be an Eagle!
