

UPDATE FROM THE TREASURER

Throughout fiscal years 2020 and 2021, the state invested \$675 million in the Student Health and Wellness program to help school districts support their students' academic achievements through mental health counseling, wraparound services, mentoring, and after-school programs. Governor Mike DeWine signed HB 110, otherwise known as Ohio's two-year budget bill, into law June 30, 2021. The bill extends funding for the Student Health and Wellness program for fiscal years 2022 and 2023.

The program is aligned with Ohio's strategic plan, Each Child, Our Future, which is designed to meet the needs of the whole child. The funds must be used to support one of 11 initiatives outlined in the state budget, and must be developed alongside a community partner.

The district is working with the Hancock County Board of Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services (ADAMHS), Hancock Public Health and the Hancock County Educational Service Center to support and expand services to meet the social and emotional needs of our students. Liberty-Benton is using the funds to provide the services of a School Nurse, Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor, School Resource Officer, and support the Leader in Me program.

These additional resources will ensure our students can reach their full potential across their educational journey.

LIBERTY-BENTON STUDENTS LEARNING HABITS FOR SUCCESS

Liberty-Benton believes all students have important strengths to share. This year, we are helping students discover their strengths and further developing their leadership skills through the Leader in Me program. Lessons and activities for students in grades K-12 will center around Stephen Covey's "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People."

With help from teachers, staff, and trained peers, students will learn to apply the following habits and related principles to their everyday lives:

- Be proactive-focuses on responsibility, choice, accountability, initiative, and resourcefulness
- **2. Begin with the end in mind**—teaches vision, commitment, and purpose
- **3. Put first things first**—stresses the importance of focus, integrity, discipline, and prioritization
- 4. Think win-win-based on mutual benefit, fairness, and abundance
- **5. Seek first to understand, then to be understood**–helps students develop respect, mutual understanding, empathy, and courage
- 6. Synergize-teaches creativity, cooperation, diversity, and humility
- Sharpen the saw–emphasizes renewal, continuous improvement, and balance

Middle and high school students will have additional opportunities to grow their emerging leadership skills. Some will serve on action teams, where students will work together on projects and activities they are interested in, while others will be selected for their school's LEAD team. These students will help guide and plan the building-wide activities for the year.

FACILITIES UPDATE



K-8 Building

- Design influenced by the Educational Visioning process, which took place in 2020 and helped Liberty-Benton reimagine its educational delivery now and in the future.
- Approximately 130,000 square feet that will include a 700-seat performance auditorium, two gymnasiums, and a cafeteria that doubles as a common area.
- Funded by the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission through the Rebuilding Ohio Schools Program and the bond issue passed by the community May 7, 2019. The state's share of the cost is 57% while 43% is being covered by local dollars.
- Expected to be complete in May of 2023.

Stadium Project

- Project included resurfacing the track, installing runways for pole vault and long jump, adding additional new areas for shot put and discus, upgrading the fence around the track, and repairing concrete.
- Funded by the district's permanent improvement funds, which are allocated for the maintenance and repair of school property.
 Permanent improvement funds are funded by a portion of the district's 0.75% income tax.
- A new synthetic turf field was installed. The project was led by Maumee Bay Turf Center, the preferred vendor for 14 NFL teams.
- Project completed in time for the first football game of the 2021 season, which took place Aug. 20.
- In use by football, girls and boys soccer teams, band, cheerleaders, and middle school programs.



High School Renovation

- Most renovations to the high school will take place in the summer of 2022. Final touches to the project will occur throughout the 2022-2023 school year.
- Notable changes include the library, which will be converted into additional classrooms; the cafetorium, which will include additional learning and collaboration space; and the gymnasium, where staff and students will feel a bit cooler thanks to the addition of air conditioning.
- Funded by the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission through the Rebuilding Ohio Schools Program and the bond issue passed by the community May 7, 2019. The state's share of the cost is 57% while 43% is being covered by local dollars.

Field House

- · Will enrich our student-athletes' experiences year-round.

SUMMER LEARNING PROGRAMS HELP STUDENTS PREPARE FOR SCHOOL YEAR

This past summer, Liberty-Benton provided summer learning programs to elementary and middle school students to assist with any learning loss they may have experienced due to the pandemic.

The first program was offered to a select group of elementary and middle school students to boost their knowledge in the areas of math and reading. The program was taught in partnership with Sylvan Learning. Fifty-six students completed nearly 2,000 hours of instruction throughout the months of June, July and August.

The second program was for K-3 students and zeroed in on reading skills. Almost 60 students took advantage of the three-week course held in August, 43 of which had 90% or above attendance. Students worked on guided reading, making words, writing and sight words.

The class was a true team effort. Liberty-Benton provided transportation to students if needed, and 16 elementary staff members taught in rotation. Many of the parent surveys echoed the same sentiment – they were appreciative of the additional learning opportunities and said it helped prepare their child for the school year ahead.
