

TREASURER'S UPDATE



Many residents may have received a larger tax bill this year due to the state ordered six-year reappraisal of real estate properties. The aim of this reappraisal by the Hancock County Auditor's Office was to catch up with current market values,

resulting in an increase in the valuation of many properties.

Sales data from 2019, 2020 and 2021 were used to establish property values for the reappraisal. As many of you know, Ohio's residential property values have been on the rise over the past few years. According to the Zillow Home Value Index, typical home values increased by 14.61% from July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022, with a three year change of 35.24% or 11.75% annually from July 2019–June 2022.

The Ohio Department of Taxation also provides annual recommendations for counties undergoing a triennial update, with an average increase of 28% in residential property values recommended for 11 counties in 2022. Regardless of the method for calculation, what we know for sure is that property values increased at a double digit pace over the last three years.

The good news for taxpayers with respect to our schools is that thanks to House Bill 920, signed into law about 50 years ago, even when home values rise, the millage for the district is adjusted so the amount of money schools collect from taxpayers does not increase.

Property values also affect state per-pupil funding, however, with higher values tending to increase local share and lower values tending to decrease it. As the school district treasurer, I want to assure you that we are closely monitoring these changes and utilizing the district forecast to model different scenarios and plan accordingly.






This Winter, our boys' bowling team bowled their way to the league championship, while our girls' bowling team was runner-up.
