I hope that this letter finds you and your family well as we continue to grind through these unchartered waters of the pandemic. It is our hope that through our newsletters that we can provide you with valuable information regarding the exciting things that are going on across the district along with other pertinent dates and upcoming events.

I would like to begin with a huge **THANK YOU** to all of you in the Ram Community who have worked closely together to initiate a great start to the 2020-21 school year. Students and parents, your patience, flexibility, understanding, and support has been tremendous. Students have adapted quickly to the protocols that were put into place as a result of the orders, mandates, and recommendations that have been issued over the past seven months. RemotEdx was created by the Ohio Department of Education, the Management Council (MCOECN), Information Technology Centers, and the Lieutenant Governor's Office to provide support for K-12 remote learning. # Madison Middle School

We are thankful for the smooth start to our school year! We had many new procedures that everyone had to learn quickly and adjust to as the school year started. Our staff and students have worked together in a great way to make these new procedures a consistent part of everyday practice in following the district reopening plan. For example, during class changes students are staggered so that only half the students in the building move to their next class at a time. This creates more open space and less traffic in the hallways to maintain social distancing as much as possible. There are also taped lines in the hallways that everyone follows to keep traffic in a one way direction on each side of the hallway. The amount of students allowed in bathrooms are limited to again maintain social distancing as much as possible. Additionally, all students were given a lanyard on the first day of

school to clip their face mask on the lanyard during mask breaks and when eating to help them keep it on their person and free from contact surfaces. Our staff created a video for students before they arrived that model these and other new procedures related to COVID. This video was shown to students on the first day of school and helped with the transition to our new normal. Special thanks to all of our staff and students for their work so far. What we do together we do better!

### District Maintenance/Building and Grounds

As the cold chill comes back into the air, we have started preparing for the inevitable winter season. The maintenance department has already purchased 20,000 pounds of rock salt for our parking lots, and 2,000 pounds of sidewalk icemelt. These supplies represent about 2/3 of what we go through in a typical year. Inside the buildings we continue our efforts to make them as safe as possible during this pandemic. All the district custodians are pitching in and doing extra work to help sanitize, and clean common contact surfaces.

The district has also added Doug Keen as a new employee to help with this disinfecting. Doug works a night shift five days a week strictly disinfecting classroom surfaces. Thanks to this addition, our goal of disinfecting every student desk and chair is being realized on a regular basis. Along with the disinfecting and cleaning efforts, we have set up hundreds of hand sanitizing stations throughout the district, and have procured thousands of face masks and face shields as personal protective equipment for students and staff.

Reminders for parents and students:

  stop and they count them as they board the bus. If a student arrives late, it is very dangerous because the student is arriving after the count putting your child at risk. This is a
  law and must be followed.

- Face coverings are required for all students. This is for the protection of everyone on the bus. Our drivers love seeing the students smiling faces but during this time we need to be safe.

# FROM THE TREASURER Robin Klenk

Since March. the COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted daily life and forced schools to manage a new reality. As far as finances are concerned, our district, like every other district in the state, received a cut in state funding as a result of the pandemic. For Madison Local Schools, the total was \$411,000 for the fiscal year which ended on June 30, 2020. This represented a 2.3% reduction in state funding that wasn't expected and not budgeted for. Madison will receive the same 2.3% reduction for this school year. To help offset the \$822,000 reduction received since March, Madison was awarded the following grant monies from the Federal and State government, ESSER (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief) \$680,925.72, of which \$100,933.67, allocated for Mansfield Christian and St. Mary's Schools, and CRF Rural and Small Town School District \$164,149.70.

Sandi Davis, Assistant Treasurer, has worked for the district for 35 years and will be retiring,



effective December 2020. Sandi's leaving marks the end of an era for Madison Local Schools. Her willingness to put in extra time and effort has demonstrated a commitment to excellence that we have all come to depend on. In addition to her incredible competence and skill, she has been a friend to all with her thoughtfulness and quiet encouragement. We would like to wish her a long and wonderful retirement. She plans to travel and spend time with her family.

If the event of a school closure, all special education students will have a distance learning plan that will outline how specially designed instruction will be delivered. Be sure to ask the intervention specialist that is working with your child about this plan if it has not been discussed with you already.

I want to start by thanking everyone for their patience and cooperation that we have exhibited during the fall. I am very proud of our coaches, athletes, and parents for all you have done to keep this going this fall.



The girls soccer team is currently 12-0-2 and ranked number 1 in the state of Ohio in Division 3 girls soccer. They are the undefeated OCC champions once again and are planning a long tournament run. Taylor

Huff was named the Offensive Player of the Year in the OCC for the FOURTH time! Tiffany Tucker, Paige Eldridge, Phyllis Stanfield, and Navaeh Lewis were all named 1st team OCC. Chesney Davis, Kari Eckenwiler, and Taylor Russell earned 2<sup>nd</sup> team OCC.

The girls volleyball team is 7-12 and they had a great come from behind win against Lexington and defeated a good Clear Fork team. The team had three girls nominated for the Mansfield News Journal player of the week. Faith Kuhn was named first team OCC, and Layne Stone was named second team OCC. The volleyball team returns all but four girls next year.
