Greetings from the Superintendent...Rob Peterson

Madison Ram Community,

As the calendar flips to 2023, I hope that this newsletter finds you and your family well and that you rang in a Happy New Year! It is hard to believe that we are already at the midpoint of the school year.

I am excited to report that the district performed quite well on its 2021-22 Local Report Card, highlighted by Meeting or Exceeding the State Standards in the following categories: Graduation Rates, Academic Achievement, Student Academic Growth, and Closing Educational Gaps for Student Subgroups. Additionally, I am proud to announce that Mifflin Elementary was 1 of only 2 schools in the entire state of Ohio to be recognized as a Nationally Distinguished School for its exceptional student performance on the state standardized tests over the past two school years. What a tremendous honor for the students, families, staff, and administration at Mifflin!

As we look forward to the spring, the district will have a levy on the ballot in May, requesting additional operating funds for the district. Please see the facts bulleted below for additional information.

Finally, I would like to thank the Madison Staff, Madison Families, and the Madison Community for all of your support and for all that you do for the students of the Madison Local School District. Go Rams!

MADISON LOCAL SCHOOLS' LEVY FAST FACTS

- Upon Board Approval, Madison Local Schools will be placing a new 8-mill levy for current operating expenses on the May 2, 2023 ballot.
- The last time the district had a levy on the ballot to seek additional operating funds was in 1997, 25 years ago.
- 8 mills will generate a little over \$3 million per year in additional operating funds for the district.
- The additional operating funds will be used to address the current deficit; to cover the increasing costs of current day-to-day operations; to continue to offer our students quality educational and extra-curricular opportunities; to recruit and retain highly-skilled teachers, non-teaching staff, and administrators; to provide our students with up-to-date, rigorous curriculum materials, technology, and other resources; and to maintain and care for all of our buildings, facilities, grounds and transportation fleet.
- 8 mills will cost the owner of a home with a tax valuation of \$100,000 approximately \$23.33 per month.
- The tax valuation of a home is not necessarily what it can be sold for at its current market value. Homeowners can access the tax valuation of their home by doing a search on the Richland County Auditor's website.
- Since the 2000-01 school year the Madison Local School District has reduced the number of district employees by 20%.
- Based on the most recent data (FY21) from the Ohio Department of Education, Madison Local Schools receives \$4,211.18 of Total Property Tax Per Student, while the average Total Property Tax Per Student among all Richland County School Districts is \$6,989.73.

bration of our partnership, donating \$20,000 in school supplies, which were put to immediate use and have assisted our teachers in providing the best possible instruction to our students.



Mifflin was named as one of 11 statewide finalists in late October and received notification from ODE in early November that our outstanding achievement had merited this recognition. Mr. Stump will be headed to Columbus in a few months to speak at a statewide conference about what makes Mifflin so special.

All three methods of access require students to sign in using their school google account information.

Once students are logged into SORA, they can add the Richland County Public Library to their account. By connecting to the public library, students will have access to age-appropriate titles from the library's digital collection. No library card is necessary—titles are borrowed using the student's google credentials! One benefit to using SORA is that there are no overdue fines or lost/damaged book fees!

Maintenance Highlights

As winter is here once again, the custodians and maintenance team members switch gears and work toward providing the safest conditions possible for our students and staff. Throughout the winter we will spread more than 3,000 pounds of ice melt over our sidewalks, most done by hand or with small broadcast spreaders. Our three district plow trucks will also be laying down rock salt on our parking lots throughout the snow and ice seasons. We typically spread between 20,000-25,000 pounds of this product via our hitch-mounted spreaders. Aside from treating the surfaces, we'll also be doing lots of plowing, snow blowing, and good old fashioned shoveling of the white stuff to try to keep kids in school as much as possible. During the winter we constantly monitor the weather forecasts on multiple sites, and whenever the threat of a snow or ice event is present we start planning a day or sometimes several days before the actual event. This can mean the 4-5 employees we have plowing coming in between 3-4:00 in the morning to start clearing the lots at the five district school sites, the Early Childhood Learning Center, and Board of Education Office. During these early morning hours Operations Supervisor Steve Crist, Superintendent Peterson, and Transportation Director Mike Yost will be on the roads by 4:30am driving the various routes throughout the district to determine if a delay, or a school closing is needed. The district's 1st shift custodians come in at 6am, and immediately put their full attention on clearing and salting the sidewalks. It's definitely a team effort of 15-20 people that allows us to get prepared before the



buses drop of their precious cargo at the beginning a snowy school day! Of course this is in addition to the yearlong work these dedicated employees provide our district. The 27 people who make up the district custodial, seasonal, and maintenance staffs, clean, care for, and maintain over 592,000 sq. ft. of buildings, and over 158 acres of land. That's cleaning, fixing, painting, mowing, trimming, and yes at this time of the year, plowing, salting, and shoveling! They are great people who work hard for our kids, and I am grateful to be able to work with them. So, the next time you see the snowflakes falling, know your Ram Team is ready to go!

The wrestling team is off to a nice start. They finished fourth at the Tom Ellis classic hosted here at Madison. Senior Hunter Hutcheson finished first in the tournament. They then traveled to the Paul Hacket tournament in Hamilton Township. The team fin-



ished first overall! Finishing in first place were Jase Braden, Hunter Hutcheson, Drayston Martin, Mike Thomas, and Dominick Whitesel. Finishing second were Gavin Cupp, Evan Davis, and Ashton Meglasson. The Rams have some big time tournaments coming up on their schedule, including the Top Gun and the Gorman.



The boys' basketball team got off to a great start, defeating Shelby and Clear Fork. The Rams then lost two tough ones in the same week, to Wooster on a shot with .6 seconds left and an overtime thriller the next night at Oregon Clay.

However, the Rams did something we may never see again, as they came from a 23 point deficit in the third quarter to defeat Ashland 70-66. Jayden Jeffries scored a career high 39 points to lead the comeback!
