



Share information about the process and why seeking to modify the schedule

- Committee started in 2019 to look at schedule options.
- Committee members
- Arrived at options that kept classes near 50 minutes
- Both semester and yearlong courses
- Ability for the continued expansion of hybrid courses:
 Ex. Courses that run Mon/Wed/Thur in-person and Tues/Fri office hours
- · Ability for CTC students to take part in activities



Yearlong goes from 165 to 150 hours *which is greater than the standard 120 hours Semester courses go from 82.5 to 75 hours

As many of you are aware, all students are encouraged to create a personalized academic and career education roadmap to provide the necessary direction for their coursework to be rigorous and relevant, and we expect students to engage in work-related experiences that will prepare and guide them whether they plan to attend college, enter the military or begin their career.

English is the only course required for 4 years which is by design. Over the last several years, we have broadened the selection of courses to reflect students needs and interests.

You can see, currently, students in grades nine and ten have very limited choice in the course selection process due to the required core courses as well as the prerequisites needed in order to get to the desired courses that meet their interests and pathway. As such, adding an additional period to the current six period schedule will allow for greater voice and choice for students, and this added period will allow students the flexibility to schedule their required courses along with more elective courses that are currently not fitting due to the limitations of the current six period schedule.

Examples include our special education students who require reading intervention above and beyond the mandatory English courses, our ESL population, as well as those students in need of credit recovery courses.

What is the Power Hour?

A one-hour block of time in the middle of the day.

• Students have time to eat and attend an activity of their choice.

• Activity Options to Include: extra-help or tutoring, acceleration, social skills, study hall, Keystone remediation, SAT test prep, graduation pathway offerings, attending clubs, club meetings, intramurals, and a variety of other activities.

• Allows students to make the most out of their lunch hour with a focus on academic success and student choice.

The Power Hour: With the recognized need for enhanced relationships and school connectedness in mind, the high school scheduling committee is recommending a power hour to be included along with the recommended schedule modification.

A power hour is a one-hour block of time in the middle of the school day in which students will eat lunch and also attend their choice from a multitude of options such as extra-help or tutoring, acceleration, working independently, attending clubs or club meetings, intramurals, and many other activities. Power hour is designed to allow students to make the most out of their lunch hour with a focus on academic success and student choice. Teachers would always have 30 minutes for their duty-free lunch but would also maintain 30 minutes for office hours, tutoring, taking care of make-up work, sponsoring clubs and activities, creating a time and space for extended learning activities and building and enhancing relationships with students. Student engagement and connection with the adults in the school would become a priority. The dedicated block of time for the power hour allows students to engage with staff or other students on a consistent basis without the conflict that exists in the current high school schedule with three flex periods at mid-day.

Some potential benefits of a power hour for students include:

- Extra support: During power hour, students can get extra help with assignments or subjects that they are struggling with. This can be particularly helpful for students who need additional support to keep up with their studies.
- Time management: Power hour can help students develop better time management skills by providing a dedicated block of time to work on their assignments.
- Increased focus and choice: By removing distractions and providing a learning space to work, power hour can help students focus more effectively on their academic tasks. Also, student choice is incorporated to meet the interests of the students.
- Improved grades: By providing students with extra support and a dedicated time to focus on their studies, power hour can help improve their grades and ensure that students can meet with staff when make-up quizzes and tests need to be scheduled.
- Sense of belonging and connection: Offering student led clubs, club meetings, mentoring, intramurals, service learning, and
 organizations related to students' areas of interests can feed into a student's sense of belonging at school. Belonging, in turn,
 correlates with greater student well-being and higher academic engagement.

Graduation pathway offerings such as: Service Learning, CPR/First Aid certification, ServSafe certification etc.

The power hour can also be seen as a benefit for staff. Common time for staff to meet is often a challenge with the high school schedule. Options within the power hour would allow for occasional lunch and learn opportunities for staff. With the existing three flex period model, staff and student schedules often do not line up. Further, getting students to come in early or to stay after school for make-up work, extra help, clubs and intramurals is often hindered due to the lack of transportation for students. With the power hour, having the one hour of dedicated time will provide a consistent availability and streamline the scheduling to better meet student needs.



Power Hour Staff Impact

Staff would receive 30 minutes for a duty-free lunch and 30 minutes to offer an activity session for interested students.

 Activity options staff could choose to offer students : office hours, tutoring, assistance with make-up work, sponsoring clubs and activities, creating a time and space for extended learning activities and building and enhancing relationships with students.

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

Lunch Options

- Full lunch will be offered from 11:00 a.m. 12:08 p.m. daily.
- Students may get in line for lunch at any time within the A or B lunch period.
- Students may eat in designated spaces (Cafeteria, Commons Area, Outside/Picnic Tables).*
- Students will be responsible for cleaning up and placing trash/recycling in one of the receptacles placed throughout the school.

*Students must stay within the designated areas while eating lunch.



Pilot Monitoring

- Evaluation of the 7 period schedule and Power Hour will be ongoing.
- Data will be gathered from:
 - Grade Distribution, Test Scores & Honor Roll
 - Discipline Referrals
 - Administrative and Staff Observations of student engagement
- Ongoing feedback and evaluation will provide administration with direction to refine the plan to ensure student success.



Next Steps



On February 9, 2023, the Board will be presented with a recommendation from administration to approve the 7 Period High School Schedule Pilot for implementation to begin in August 2023.
