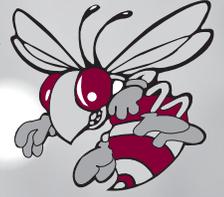

### WHAT IS ON THE BALLOT?

Voters will consider the following separate propositions on the ballot:

#### Proposition #1 – School Budget

The school will be authorized to expend the sum set forth in its estimate of expenditures for the 2022-23 school year in the amount of \$25,524,093 and to levy the necessary taxes therefore.

#### Proposition #2 – School Vehicle Replacement

The school will be authorized to spend up to \$315,000 to purchase and replace school buses.

#### Proposition #3 – New 2022 Reserve to Replace Old 2019 Reserve

The school would be authorized to create a new "School Vehicle Reserve-2022" to replace the old "School Vehicle Reserve-2019" with an increase in the maximum threshold of \$500,000. Any existing monies in the old 2019 reserve must be transferred to the new 2022 reserve.

### BOARD OF EDUCATION ELECTIONS:

There are three full term (three year) Board seats up for election this year, commencing in July 2022. Qualified voters will select from the following candidates at the polls: Kimberly Carlson, Heidi Ball, and Jeffrey Cook.

# Three part budget expenditures

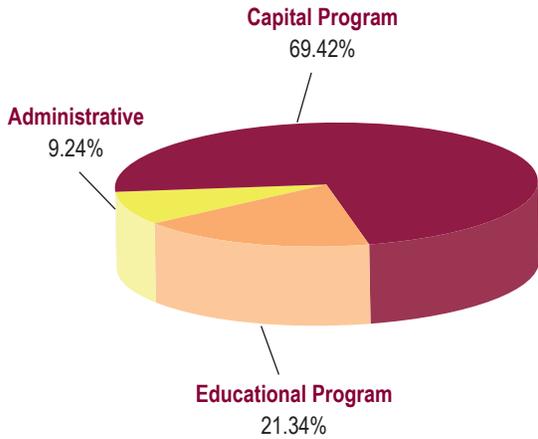
New York State law requires that school districts present the proposed budget in three parts: administrative, educational program, and capital.

**Administrative component** – includes expenses for the Board of Education, central administration, instructional supervision, curriculum development, legal services, central data processing, printing, mailing, storage, and employee benefits attributable to salaries included in these functions.

**Educational program component** – includes expenditures for instructional programs, school library/ audiovisual, attendance, counseling, health services, interscholastic athletics, student transportation, transfers to special aid fund, and employee benefits attributable to salaries included in these functions.

**Capital component** – includes expenses for operations and maintenance, grounds, security, utilities, principal and interest payments for debt service, transfers to capital fund, and employee benefits attributable to salaries included in these functions.

The 2022-23 general fund proposed budget includes a capital outlay project at the Jr/Sr High School Building. This project will include the removal of an underground fuel oil tank and some interior flooring renovations. The total cost of the project will not exceed \$100,000 and is aided through NYS building aid. By completing this work in the 2022-23 school year, the District will receive the NYS building aid in the subsequent year.

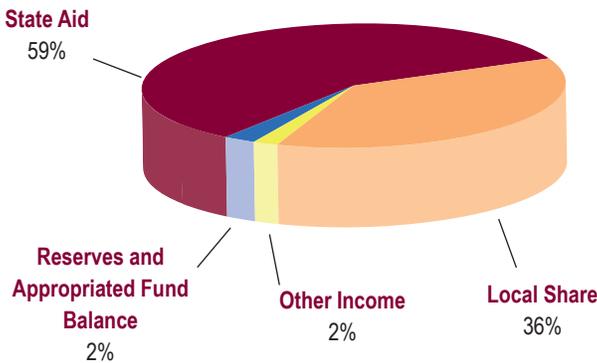

The local share, which represents local property taxes and STAR, accounts for 35.98% of revenues. District income, which represents all other sources of revenue, accounts for 4.64% of revenues.

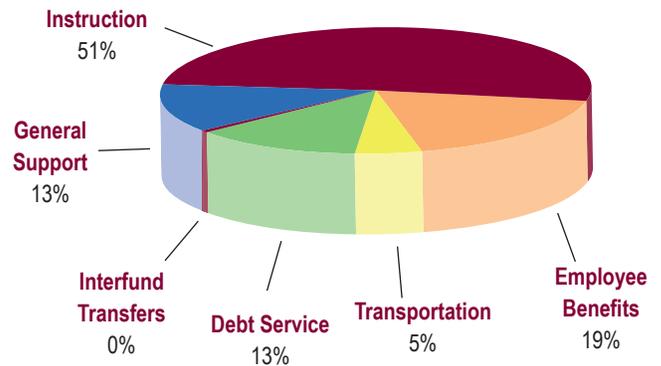

# School bus proposition

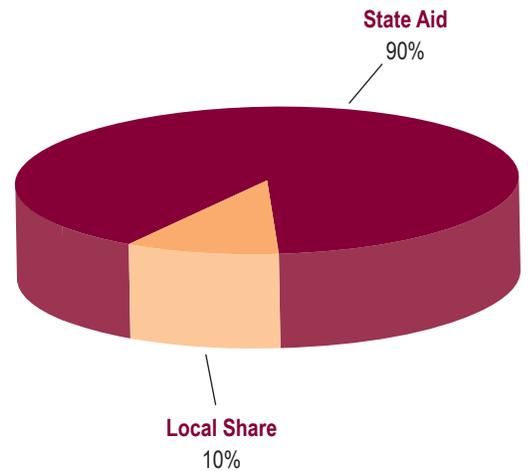
The District will have a proposition to purchase replacement school buses on the ballot on May 17, 2022 in an amount not to exceed \$315,000. The proposition includes the purchase of two (2) 66 passenger buses and one (1) wheelchair bus. With the purchase of buses annually, the District will continue to have the fleet of 24 school vehicles on a 7 to 9 year replacement schedule.

Byron Bergen is receiving approximately 90% State transportation aid on our 2021-22 school bus purchase. If the aid ratio remains the same for these two new buses,

the district would receive \$283,500 in aid. The remaining \$31,500 would be local share responsibility.

### Summary of bus proposition:

- Proposition amount = \$315,000
- Proposed # of buses = 2
- Proposed # of wheelchair bus = 1
- State transportation aid = \$283,500
- Local share = \$31,500
- Local share per bus = \$12,000
- Local share for the wheelchair bus = \$7,500
- Tax increase for a \$100,000 home = less than \$2.00/year

The 2022-23 tax levy amount would remain the same as the 2021-22 actual tax levy amount. As a result, the 2022-23 proposed budget must be adjusted to reflect the reduction in tax collection. The 2022-23 budget reductions include the elimination of all equipment purchases (per Education Law), elimination of public newsletters, elimination of Alumni Hall of Fame inductees, reduction in staff development and reduction in materials and supplies purchases.

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2022-23 by the qualified voters of the Byron Bergen School District, Genesee, Monroe and Orleans Counties, New York, will be held on Tuesday, May 17, 2022 between the hours of 12:00 pm and 9:00 pm, prevailing time in the Jr/Sr High School building, at which time the polls will be opened to vote by voting ballot. # Answering your tax-related questions...

## Q. What is Byron-Bergen Central School's budget for next year?

A. The proposed budget is \$25,524,093. This represents a budget-to-budget increase of 2.13%.

## Q. Were any programs or staff cut in the 2022-23 proposed budget?

A. No, the school is receiving additional State aid this year, no cuts were made.

## Q. What is Byron-Bergen's allowable tax levy limit?

A. Under the law, the school could establish a maximum tax levy limit of 2.31% for a simple majority vote. However, with the promised increase in State Aid funds, the District will be able to balance our budget with a proposed tax levy increase of 1.75% for 2022-23 school year.

## Q. Were any programs added to the 2022-23 proposed budget?

A. The school continues to add programs in the areas of Advanced Placement courses, STEM and science, Agriculture, and other course electives; along with providing extra support at our elementary levels for reading and math interventions. We also plan on continuing our summer learning programming for students K-8 and our extended day programming for students at the Elementary and Jr./Sr. High School levels next year. Most importantly, we put the social and emotional health of our students at the forefront and have added a school social worker to the Elementary School. We continue to prioritize Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) across the District.

## Q. Why is the budget increasing 2.13%?

A. The majority of the spending increase is resulting from a 12.5% increase in health insurance premiums, increases in out of district tuition costs for some new students, increases in utility costs, and replacement of student 1:1 technology devices which are reaching "end of life" in June 2022.

## Q. Why is the School presenting Proposition #3 asking for the voters to establish a new reserve fund titled, "School Vehicle Reserve-2022"?

A. On May 21, 2019, the school received voter approval to create "School Vehicle Reserve-2019" with a maximum funding threshold of \$500,000. Starting with the 2022-23 the school year, the school will be using monies from the "School Vehicle Reserve-2019" to purchase buses and will not be borrowing. Using these reserve funds allows the school to save money as attorney fees, financial advisor fees, and interest costs will not be incurred. With the 2019 Reserve threshold set at \$500,000 and the cost of school buses increasing, the District will only be able to use the 2019 reserve for two years. By the end of the 2023-24 school year the entire \$500,000 will be expended. Proposition #3 on the May 17, 2022 ballot is asking voters to authorize the creation of a new "School Vehicle Reserve-2022" with a maximum threshold of \$1 million. Just like the old 2019

Reserve, the new 2022 Reserve would only be used to purchase school vehicles; however, the school would be able to use the reserve for bus purchases beyond the 2023-24 school year. As the proposition language states, "if the voters approved the creation of the new 'School Bus Vehicle Reserve-2022,' the existing 'School Bus Vehicle Reserve-2019' must be dissolved and any monies in the old 2019 reserve must be transferred to the new 2022 Reserve.

## Q. Is the STAR program still in effect?

A. Yes. The STAR program is in effect. The STAR exemption is a reduction on your school tax bill for homeowners who participated in the STAR exemption program prior to 2015 and continue to meet the eligibility requirements. For the Basic STAR exemption, the homeowner will see a reduction of \$30,000 in taxable assessed value. For the Enhanced STAR exemption, the homeowner will see a reduction of \$74,900 in taxable assessed value.

The STAR credit check is for eligible homeowners since 2015 and after. If you purchased your primary residence after August 1, 2015 and your income is \$500,000 or less, you will receive a STAR check in the mail each year. For the STAR credit check method only, STAR exemption amounts may be increased by New York State by 2% or less each year.

## Q. How do new homeowners apply for their STAR benefit?

A. For homes purchased after August 1, 2015, the homeowner will need to register for the STAR credit through New York State rather than applying with your assessor. For these homeowners, a STAR credit will be received in the form of a check from New York State directly.

## Q. Am I eligible for the Enhanced Star benefit?

A. If you own your home and it is your primary residence, are age 65 by December 31, 2022 and your income is \$92,000 or less, you are eligible for the Enhance STAR benefit. Go to [www.tax.ny.gov](http://www.tax.ny.gov) for more information.

## Q. What effect does an increase in property assessments have on my school taxes?

A. Increases in property assessments can cause an increase in your tax bill to be greater than the proposed 1.75%. Please note, the school is not involved in any increases/decreases with your property assessment. If you have any questions with regard to your assessment or need any information changed on your tax bill, you should contact your town tax assessor.



# What will you see at the polls?

## Proposition #1 – 2022-23 School Budget

RESOLVED that the proposed budget of expenditures of the Byron-Bergen Central School District for the school year 2022-23, totaling \$25,524,093 and for the purposes shown in the statement of estimated expenditures adopted by the Board of Education, be and the same hereby is approved and the amount thereof shall be raised by a levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the school district, after first deducting the monies available from State Aid and other sources as provided by law.

## Proposition #2 – Acquisition of School Buses

RESOLVED that the Board of Education of the Byron-Bergen Central School District is hereby authorized to acquire two (2) 66 passenger school buses and (1) wheelchair bus at a cost not to exceed \$315,000, which is estimated to be the maximum cost thereof, expend such sums for such purpose, levy the tax necessary therefore, to be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education, taking into account State aid received, and in anticipation of the collection of such tax, to issue bonds and notes of the district at one time or from time to time, or enter into a lease-purchase agreement to acquire said vehicles.

## Proposition #3 – School Vehicle Reserve Fund

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Byron-Bergen Central School District, Genesee, Monroe and Orleans Counties, New York (the "District") is hereby authorized and directed to:

- (A) Establish a capital reserve fund pursuant to Education Law Section 3651, to be known as the "School Vehicle Reserve-2022" for the purpose of financing, in whole or in part, the purchase of school buses and vehicles by the District, with the ultimate amount of such reserve fund not exceeding one million and 00/100 Dollars (\$1,000,000) plus any accrued earnings on amounts deposited in such reserve fund, the probable existence of said reserve fund being ten (10) years, but with such reserve fund continuing in existence for its stated purpose until liquidated in accordance with the Education Law, and the sources from which funds shall be obtained for said reserve fund being (i) current and future unappropriated fund balances from the School Vehicle Fund-2019 of the District, as directed by the Board of Education, and (ii) any other appropriations authorized by the voters from time to time; and
- (B) transfer to said capital reserve fund the entire balance on deposit in said District's existing School Vehicle Reserve-2019 established pursuant to Education Law Section 3651 pursuant to a proposition approved by the qualified voters of said District on May 21, 2019.

**Proposition #4** – To elect THREE (3) MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION for a three (3) year term commencing on July 1, 2022 and expiring on June 30, 2025 and to succeed Kimberly Carlson, Yvonne Ace-Wagoner, and Jennifer VanValkenberg.

# Estimated Tax Information

Homeowners are eligible for tax relief under New York State's Tax Relief Program (STAR). Upon application, homeowners may be eligible for up to a \$30,000 decrease in their assessment. Senior citizens (age 65 and older) may be eligible for Enhanced STAR for up to a \$74,900 decrease in their assessment. The STAR exemption is authorized by section 425 of the Real Property Tax Law.

## Voter Eligibility and Absentee Voting Information

You are eligible to vote if you are:

- a United States citizen
- at least 18 years of age
- have lived in Byron-Bergen Central School District for at least 30 days prior to vote

\* Identification required

All occupants of houses or apartments who meet the criteria may vote, as may any college student whose primary address is in the district. Pre-registration is not required.
