
























Elementary School News Kristin Loftus, Elementary School Principal



The 24-25 school year has had an amazingly strong start! We repeated some events to kick off the year with expectations in the same way as last year. Mrs. Kaercher (Coordinator of Student Services) and I went into each classroom to speak with students about the

Core Values as well as

the Code of Conduct. In addition. Mrs. Kaercher shared a video with all students about Core Values in the Cafeteria. We were also fortunate to bring each bus together again with their bus driver and Mr. Wilkins (Head Bus Driver) for a bus meeting to

discuss how we all need to follow Core Values and look out for each other since the bus is a community in itself! With all that said, students are in the routine and are thriving!

Elementary entrepreneurs launch Busy Bee Cafe

On October 25th, Natalie Malick's 3rd through 5th-grade students relaunched the Byron-Bergen Elementary School beverage service. Formally known as the Coffee Cart, the students renamed the program Busy Bee Cafe and created a new logo, menu, and loyalty program cards.

"The idea for the rebrand really started with the students," said Malick, a 12:1:1 Teacher at Byron-Bergen Elementary School.



Busy Bee Cafe is more than a beverage service. Students learn small business skills such as money management, inventory, ordering, and comparison shopping.

"I like the money part," said a participating student. "They give me one dollar and I give them fifty cents back."

"One of the great aspects of this project is that the kids work toward short-term and long-term goals," said Malick. "They need to get the service ready for Friday, but they also need to plan for every additional Friday this year."

Busy Bee Cafe is a stationary self-serve beverage counter outside of Malick's classroom. Previously a morning service, the cafe now opens at 11 a.m. every Friday and offers a wider variety of beverages including sparkling flavored waters.

"Mrs. Malick and Mrs. Ladley do a great job working with students to put all of this together," said Byron-Bergen Elementary Principal Kristin Loftus. "It is a wonderful lesson in all the pieces that are necessary for starting and running a business! What better way to help students understand why learning math, reading, and problem solving in school is so important."

All proceeds from Busy Bee Cafe are put toward the continuation of the program.

Pesticide Notice

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation enacted a program that requires all schools to provide you with information about pesticide product applications made throughout the school year. Under State law, the school is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour advance written notice prior to a pesticide application. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- · Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-eat pastes, forms, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- · Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- · The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR.25;
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals.

In the event that an emergency application is necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list. To register your name with the school to be on a 48-hour notification list, send a request to Byron-Bergen Central School District Office, 6917 W Bergen Rd., Bergen, NY 14416. A written request must be submitted annually.

Transportation Notice

To comply with New York State law, parents/ guardians who are sending their child to a private or parochial school for the 2025-2026 school year must make a request for transportation, if needed, to our Transportation Department prior to April 1, 2025. State Education law states that the timely filing of the request for transportation is the responsibility of the parent or guardian and does not require the home school district to accept a request that is received after April 1, 2025.

Byron-Bergen FFA tops off award-winning season with strong show at Nationals

On October 21, 2024, members of the Byron-Bergen FFA traveled to Indianapolis to participate in the FFA National Convention. The trip caps off a successful competition cycle for the B-B FFA which began Spring 2024.

In April, chapter members competed at SUNY Cobleskill in the Agricultural Mechanical and Technical Systems Career Development Event (CDE). The team comprised of Justin Deleo, Gary Donofrio III, Jackson Lundfelt, and Kasey Pagels earned first place ranking in the state and the honor of representing New York at the National Convention. Individually, Donofrio placed 10th, Deleo placed 3rd and Lundfelt placed 1st in the state.

In May, B-B FFA competed at the state convention in Buffalo. The chapter's floriculture team was comprised of Ruth Kuipers, Grace Mundell, Paige O'Brien, and Brook Pagels. Ruth Kuipers placed 10th individually. In junior tool identification, Grant Kuipers placed 2nd individually and the team of Hunter Jarosinski and Trevor O'Brien placed 3rd. Donofrio was the winner of the state swine production-entrepreneurship proficiency. B-B FFA put forward two teams in the Maple contest; Team 1 of Carter Kuipers, Donofrio, K. Pagels and Deleo and Team 2 of R. Kuipers, J. Lundfelt, Taylor Lundfelt, and B. Pagels who placed 4th in the state. Jackson Lundfelt was the 1st place individual.

The New York State Fair brought more competition and more success. G. Kuipers placed 1st in the state in Junior Poultry Evaluation. In Senior Poultry Evaluation, Ellie Tanner placed 3rd for individuals. The team of B. Pagels, K. Pagels, T. Lundfelt, and E. Tanner placed 2nd in the state and went on to compete at the Eastern States Exposition (Big E) in Springfield, MA in September. The team placed 6th and T. Lundfelt placed 6th individually.

Also at the Big E, The Vegetable Crops Identification/Horticulture team of R. Kuipers, T. Lundfelt, Grace Mundell, and B. Pagels placed 1st, qualifying them to compete at the National Junior Horticulture Convention held in Lincoln, NE later this year. Individually, Mundell placed 10th and R. Kuipers earned 1st place honors.

The team of C. Kuipers and K. Pagels placed 1st in Diesel Troubleshooting. In individual rankings, Kuipers placed 1st and Pagels placed 2nd. In Junior Small Engine Troubleshooting, Hunter Jarosinski and Trevor O'Brien placed 2nd as a team. Jarosinski placed 3rd individually and O'Brien placed 4th.

"The students have been absolutely brilliant this year," said B-B FFA Advisor Jeff Parnapy. "I was so proud to take them to Nationals again this year and watch them compete against the best in the country."





At Nationals, the team of Deleo, Donofrio, J. Lundfelt, and K. Pagels was named a Silver Emblem Team in FFA Agricultural Technology and Mechanical Systems CDE. J. Lundfelt was named a Gold Emblem Individual, Deleo was named a Silver Emblem Individual, and Donofrio and Pagels were named Bronze Emblem Individuals.

"It's a remarkable achievement," said Parnapy. "For an FFA chapter that was only founded seven years ago to earn recognition at Nationals alongside teams approaching their 100-year anniversary is astounding. I can't wait to see what next season brings."






