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

Letter from Dr. Terry W. Worrell



Thank you for taking time to review the Asheboro City Schools annual report for 2017-2018. Our annual report provides our community

a glimpse into the outstanding opportunities that are provided to our students and educators each year. In addition to student performance and growth measures, we take this time to share about the tremendous work taking place in and out of our classrooms.

To begin, I'd like to share with you our student academic growth. It gives me great pleasure to share for the second year in a row, all of our schools met growth and three of our schools exceeded growth according to North Carolina testing standards. This accomplishment reflects the hard work of our students and dedication of our staff. Charles W. McCrary Elementary, Asheboro High, and North Asheboro Middle Schools exceeded expected growth.

In addition to growing our students, we are also graduating our students with portable credentials and college courses, so they are ready for life after high school. The graduating class of 2018's four-year cohort graduation rate was 92.7 percent, which continues to exceed the state graduation rate. This is an outstanding achievement, making Asheboro City Schools one of the top ten school districts across the state of North Carolina based on graduation performance.

Our students are taking advantage of the many learning opportunities available in Asheboro City Schools. Throughout the school day, students are choosing to enroll in the Asheboro High School Early College Academy, the Asheboro High School Health Sciences Academy, the Advanced Placement Capstone program, Pathways to Prosperity, and

numerous career and technical education courses.

At Lindley Park and Balfour Elementary Schools, students are also taking advantage of innovative learning opportunities such as our Dual Language Immersion program.

We celebrate our successes and remain focused on continuous improvement.





Dual-Language Program



sheboro City Schools was Apleased to expand the Dual-Language Immersion program to Lindley Park Elementary School during the 2017-2018 school year. The elective program is offered to kindergarten students who are taught in English and Spanish. uring the 2017-2018 school year, students from Asheboro High School enrolled in the first cohort of the Apprenticeship Randolph program which provides an opportunity to receive paid, onthe-job training while earning an Associate of Applied Science degree in Manufacturing Technology through Randolph Community College. The program is a way to create awareness and generate interest in modern manufacturing, and provides a vehicle for expanding the workforce pool for advanced manufacturing in Randolph County.

After-School Program

During the 2017-2018 school year, Asheboro City Schools expanded its after-school program to all five elementary schools throughout the district. The after-school program is offered onsite, where students are provided with an afternoon snack, help with homework, and recreational time at a minimal cost to our families. Hour of Code

r or the third year, Asheboro City Schools hosted the Hour of Code event, promoting computer coding to students across our community. The event is an introduction to computer science, designed to demystify computer coding. Hands-on learning takes place at stations where students have the opportunity to work with their friends, teachers, and families. The district anticipates offering this special event for years to come.





Opportunities for Home-School and Private-School Families

↑ sheboro City Schools will offer dual-enrollment Apportunities for home-school and private-school students starting with the 2019-2020 school year. Homeschool and private-school students may take classes virtually or in the classroom through our dual-enrollment program. Opportunities will also be available for students to dualenroll in the AHS Early College Academy and Career and College Promise courses through Randolph Community College. Students enrolled in at least two classes may participate in Asheboro High School extracurricular activities. AHS Renovation Project

During the 2017-2018 school year, Asheboro City Schools completed the design phase of the Asheboro High School **Expansion and Renovation** project. The project is made possible thanks to the leadership of the Asheboro City Board of Education, generous support from the Randolph County Commissioners, input from district leadership, and the architects with Smith Sinnett Architecture. The project will allow us to: extend the life of the original 1950 structure; increase our core capacity to meet the needs of our growing population; provide additional classrooms and multi-use spaces; create a state-of-the-art learning environment that will allow us to continue providing innovative programs to bolster student success.



Female Academy

We are grateful to all of our community partners who have been instrumental in the renovation and restoration of the historic Asheboro Female Academy. Coding Grant

↑ sheboro City Schools was Aawarded \$28,900 through the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction's new Coding and Mobile App Development Grant Program at the end of 2017. Asheboro City Schools was one of 15 school districts to receive grant funding. The grant is being used to support partnerships with local businesses to help schools develop computer science, coding, and mobile app development programs for middle and high school students.


