Q: What is the South Sudan Project?

A: This is a service learning project for BMS seventh graders. Students read *A Long Walk to Water* and meet Bol Aweng, a former refugee from South Sudan. Then students are inspired to organize and run various fundraisers to raise money for a health clinic in South Sudan.

Q: How did the project start?

A: Eight years ago, I and retired teacher Natalie Mroz read *A Long Walk to Water* and googled "Lost boys living in Columbus" to see if we could have an authentic experience with our students.



Q: Why is it important to donate to South Sudan?


A: This is as developing country. People living in our friend Bol's village do not receive federal funds for basic needs such as clean water and healthcare. They rely on people like us to help provide simple necessities such as food.

Q: What is Bol's story?

A: When he was 6 years old, war came to his village. He was tending the cattle and was far away from his family, so he had to run. For 14 years, he lived in refugee camps until he finally came to America. He started the Buckeye Clinic in Columbus after he graduated from OSU.

Q: Which activities are you doing to fundraise?

A: Battle of the Buckets, a Carnival, a Pie in the Face assembly, an auction, and local restaurant fundraisers.



BMS Students Travel Near and Far During Breaks




