<u>A.P. European Hístory ~ 2024 Summer Assígnment</u>

<u>Congratulations</u>! You've elected to take one of UAHS's most challenging and rewarding courses. This course is designed for students who love history and want the challenge of a college-level class while in high school. As you begin your study of European history, it is very important that you know the political and physical geography of the continent. This assignment should assist with that. The Summer Assignment is worth 10% of your Quarter One grade.


ASSIGNMENT.

1. <u>Purchase a twin pocket file folder with fasteners.</u> You can find these at most drug, grocery and office supply stores. Our school store sells them for less than a dollar. Make certain that you get a folder *with fasteners*. You can order them online, but because they are so cheap, you usually can only in this in bulk. Make sure you get the correct type of folder. Why? Throughout this course you will be learning a lot of history, any of it may appear on the 2025 A.P. European History Exam. The maps are just the beginning: you will continue to add to this folder with each unit, so that by May 2025 it will serve as a self-made review book. It is something that you will be able to access throughout the course and reference important information *even faster* than searching for something online.

2. <u>Make two maps, one physical map and one political map of Europe</u>. Label on the map the items listed below. I recommend making your map on 11 by 17 inch paper, so that you can make a big, clear map. But you can use whatever size paper is convenient for you: just make the maps *clear*. Make sure that you make two maps on two pieces of paper. Make sure that the map fits nicely into your folder. Make sure that each map includes all of the content identified below. Make sure that you hand-draw the map—do not trace or create a digital map. The map doesn't have to be perfectly to-scale. It does, however, need to be generally accurate, especially as the borders of countries and their relation to bodies of water and other physical features are concerned.

Why? You need to know your geography. The places and features you identify on this map are places that I will be discussing in this class. For example, Lake Ladoga played a significant role in how the Soviet Union won World War II. The proximity of Sarajevo to Serbia sparked conflict in both the 1910s and the 1990s. Geneva's location in the foothills of the Swiss Alps, right on the border with France, enabled it to be a place of refuge for many radicals throughout European history. Personally hand-drawing this map will acquaint you with the landscape of Europe, enabling you to better understand the story of Europe as we learn about it this year.



Here's an example of what a folder with clasps and a folded 11x17" paper would look like.

This entire assignment should take around three to four hours to complete. It can be done at any point of time during the summer break. It is due on **MONDAY AUGUST 19, 2024**.
