What is College Credit Plus?



College Credit Plus

- CCP was designed to increase dual enrollment opportunities for students to earn college and high school credits at the same time.
- The purpose of this program is to promote rigorous academic pursuits and to provide a wide variety of options for Bellbrook students in grades 7-12.
- As required by law, Bellbrook Sugarcreek Schools will bear all tuition costs for classes taken through public universities. Students choosing to enroll in a participating private college or university may incur limited costs.

College Credit Plus

Take college classes at any University (at the college campus or online)

Take college classes at the Bellbrook High School Campus (limited options)

Who is Eligible?

“College-ready” students who qualify for college admission.

Consider social/emotional readiness, organization and time management skills.

Students must meet admission requirements and deadlines.

- ❑ This includes a qualifying ACT/SAT exam score or a placement test.
- ❑ GPA* > 3.0
- ❑ GPA* > 2.75 and A or B in English/Math

Mature Content

“The subject matter of a course enrolled in under the college credit plus program may include **mature subject matter** or materials, including those of a graphic, explicit, violent, or sexual nature, that will not be modified based upon college credit plus enrollee participation regardless of where course instruction occurs.”

Students must complete a “Permission Slip” that will be provided to the students with the college’s application for admission.

Things to consider:

College eligible and college ready are not the same . . .

Colleges are populated with adults

Scheduling



Must be a full-time student
(min. 6 units per sem.)

Can earn up to 30 college
credit hours per academic
year.

No more than 120 college
credit hours while in the
program.

May take classes during the
summer, fall and spring
semesters

Scheduling

- $30 - (\text{high school only credits} \times 3) = \text{Maximum number of College Credit Plus credit hours}$

- If student takes more than 30 credit hours, student has option to drop or pay for class at the standard college rate plus cost of books for the additional credit hours.

Scheduling cont.

- Must work with High School Counselor and College Academic Advisor to complete CCP & H.S. schedule.
 - Allowable vs. Non-Allowable courses (level 1 - first 15 hours)
 - Student will be held financially responsible if signed up for a non-allowable course
 - Example: Sinclair Community College
- College Advisors will help students know which courses they can take
- Must complete all high school graduation required courses
 - Courses must satisfy high school graduation requirements
 - Course Substitution Crosswalk

Failure or Withdrawal from a CCP Course

- No credit is awarded for a failed course
- If the failed course is a requirement for high school graduation, it must be retaken at Bellbrook High School and completed before graduation
- **Financial responsibility belongs to the student and his/her parents in the case of failure or withdrawal**
- Underperforming Students – student is placed on CCP probation when they earn lower than a 2.0 cumulative GPA in college courses or withdraw from 2 or more courses in same term.

Grades

- All advanced standing programs will be weighted the same
- BHS transcripts show both a weighted and non weighted GPA. The 4.0 (unweighted) scale is used for honor roll and NHS eligibility.



EOC

- Students must complete End of Course exams for English, Math and Science
- CCP courses in History will satisfy the EOC requirement if the student takes either Government or US History
 - Example: PLS 1120 at WSU, student gets a B, equals a 5 for the Government EOC exam

Academic Credit: CCP to BHS

Convert college credit as follows:

3 or more semester hour college course = 1 credit at BHS

2 semester hour college course = 0.66 credits at BHS

1 semester hour college course = 0.33 credits at BHS

Academic Credit: Transfer Credits

- If a student attends the same college after high school graduation, full credit is transferred.
- Students should check transfer policies of the college(s) of interest.

- Credit is not guaranteed at out of state public colleges and private universities.
 - Some colleges do not accept CCP credits taught by BHS instructors.
 - The “receiving” college will determine which courses to transfer from the “sending” college
- **YOU** must request your college transcripts

Extracurricular & Athletic Eligibility

- CCP students are allowed to participate in all Bellbrook High School activities
 - MUST BE PASSING 5 CLASSES
- CCP students must report quarter grades to athletic office
 - Be careful with B term courses

Selective Service (Males 18+)

- Male students at least 18 years of age are required to be registered with the Selective Service System and report their Selective Service number to the college within 30 days of 18th birthday.
- If he does not submit his Selective Service number, the student will not be considered a College Credit Plus participant for that current semester or term and will be responsible for any tuition, textbooks, or fees associated with the classes for which he is enrolled.

Accommodations

Students must work directly with college staff (disability services office) to determine if accommodations are needed. IEPs and 504 plans may or may not be included in the discussions.

Textbooks

- Cost of textbooks is included if it is a required book
- Check Mrs. Scohy's office first before ordering books
- If not in the BHS textbook inventory then get books from the college bookstore online
- Turn all books into Mrs. Scohy at the completion of the course or a fee will be charged

Benefits vs. Risks of CCP

Benefits

- Extends the HS curriculum
- Earn both high school and college credit
- Financial benefit
- Savings in cost and time by taking Basic Education Requirements before entering College
- Experience College early to understand the expectations of college life

Benefits vs. Risks of CCP

Risks

- Increased STUDENT responsibility
 - No parent access to student progress until final grade (FERPA)
- Scheduling conflicts (2 hour delays, athletics, field trips, spring break, and other school functions)
- Athletic/Extracurricular eligibility
- Affects GPA “College Transcript Lives Forever”
- Could affect Financial Aid in the long run
- Risk of credits not transferring or counting towards your major
- Cost of transportation
- Could incur financial obligation if course is dropped or failed
- College Tests
 - Fewer in number over the semester, cover more material, bigger impact on final grade (fewer hw assignments)
- College Coursework
 - Requires more independent thinking, longer writing assignments & out of class research

Summary of Acceptance

1. **Student** and Parents must attend the CCP Info Presentation
2. **Student** completes online Intent to Participate google form by April 1st!
 - INTENT TO PARTICIPATE Code: **CCP2024@BHS**
3. **Student** completes online application for college by May 1st
 - Do not complete if you are a returning CCP student for the same college
 - Complete the permission slip and mature content paperwork
4. **Student** takes placement test, if needed
5. **Student** receives acceptance letter in mail or email

Summary of Next Steps

Once you've been accepted:

1. **Student** completes New Student Orientation
2. **Student** schedules meeting with an Academic Advisor at the college
3. **Student** registers for classes
4. **Student** meets with Mrs. Scohy to review BHS schedule before 1st day of school in August
5. **Student** gets CCP books

Tips

- Know how to login!
 - You have a college email; you need to check it too!
- Complete the “How To Succeed Online”
- Schedule your classes early!
- B term classes could jeopardize your eligibility
- Pay attention to deadlines, college professors don’t care! School calendars are NOT the same! One missed assignment could mean a “B”
- Academic Integrity
- Take a class that is required for your future major
- THESE ARE COLLEGE CLASSES, NO ONE IS MONITORING YOUR PROGRESS!!!!!!!!!!
- If you waitlist, make sure to check back
- Get a book if it’s on your booklist! CCP funds are loaded 7 days before start, only pays for “required” books.
- Use Rate my professors website
- Attend a [CCP Information Night](#)

What Classes?

- **DO YOUR RESEARCH!** Don't just take what your friends are taking!
- Do you know what you want to major in?
- Check your future college's core requirements
- Use Transferology to make sure it will transfer
- Save your majors classes for your future college
