Greetings Holley Families,

Happy Spring! We are entering the final quarter of our school year and are looking forward to various activities and special events.

After receiving full approval from the NYS Education Department, we have completed the bid process for our capital project and are preparing for work to begin. We anticipate that construction projects in both schools will start at the end of this school year and into the summer. There will be a need to relocate some summer programs (e.g., Camp Rising Hawk and summer food services will move to the MS/HS), and you may notice contractors around the campus. We are working with our construction management team to ensure that there is as little disruption to students' regular school day experiences as possible.

Our school budget vote will be held on **Tuesday**, **May 21st**. We will be having the Board of Education election and budget vote at the MS/HS (6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.). There will be absentee and early voting mail-in ballots available.

This year, there will again be three propositions for your consideration. The traditional school budget proposition, a request for replacement bus purchases, and one to support the community library.

There will be detailed information on our 2024-25 school budget and candidates for the Holley Board of Education in our annual Budget Newsletter in May and you can also check for updates on our district website www.hollevcsd.org/Budget2024-25.aspx.

The annual Budget Hearing where the district budget is presented will be held on May 7, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. in the Elementary School Cafeteria.





On April 8, our region was in the path of the totality for the Solar Eclipse for the first time in 99 years. More than 300,000 visitors were anticipated to travel through our region. Through this lesson, they were able to apply mathematical concepts and real-world problem-solving skills.

Fifth Year of OSOB Initiative Merges Mystery and PIE

The Elementary School (ES) is participating in its fifth year of the One School, One Book (OSOB) initiative. This year, students and staff are collectively reading "PIE" by Sarah Weeks. 
Chess **Explorers Club**

Jewell-Smith Secures Wrestling Sectional Patch

Ending a decade-long state tournament hiatus



For the first time in 11 years, a Holley wrestler competed in the New York State Public High School Athletics Association (NYSPHSAA) wrestling tournament. Junior and team captain Hunter Jewell-Smith wrestled in the 285-pound weight class for the Holley-Kendall Varsity Wrestling Team. He was named Section V Class D2 Champion this winter; this is the first time a Holley wrestler has won a sectional title since 2016. After earning the first-place spot on the podium by pin at sectionals, he then placed second at the super sectional tournament, which advanced him to the state tournament – something a Holley wrestler has not accomplished since 2013.

Hunter received a special recognition and send-off from students and staff during the MS/HS Winter Pep Assembly before February recess, and the local fire companies escorted him out of town as he headed to Albany for the state tournament.

He finished with three wins by pin and two losses, just shy of placing in the top eight. He ended his season with an overall record of 40 wins and 7 losses. During the season, Hunter took first place in the Perry Wrestling Tournament and Medina's Gary Gross Memorial Tournament. He was also named a Genesee Region All-Star.

Stop for School Buses: Reminders and Repercussions

Important safety reminders from the Holley Transportation Department and New York State Operation Safe Stop:

- It is illegal and very dangerous to pass a stopped school bus when the large red lights located on top of the bus are flashing.
 - o Yellow flashing lights mean the bus is going to stop. Slow down!
 - o Red flashing lights mean students are getting on or off the bus.
- You must stop whether you are approaching the school bus from the front or overtaking it from the
- You must always stop for flashing red lights, even on divided and multilane highways and on school arounds.
- The first-time fine for illegally passing a school bus is a \$250 to \$400 fine, 5 points on your license, and/or possibly 30 days in jail.
- Worse yet, the memory of hitting or killing a child may be one you carry for the rest of your life.
